On the Air Waves Henry Morgan Show Leaves Air; May Be on TV in Fall

NEW YORK (AP). Making way for more summer changes, NBC reports the Henry Morgan Sunday evening comedy series will go off the network after the June 18 broadcast. A western will replace him.

Henry plans a vacation trip to Europe, and upon return will make another try at television. His comedy at one hour or another, has been running about two years. It started as a summer replacement and then was extended into the fall season. The show going in is Western Caravan, a cowboy drama which will have Tex Williams from the movies.

In television, Milton Berle has been taking a 13-week vacation from NBC-TV. His sponsor has renewed his contract for next season and the network will fill his time off with feature movies. Meanwhile, the summer schedules bring these developments: CBS, Starlight Operetta, 13-week series from Dallas, Texas, which include singers from stage, screen and concert.

NBC, The Truitts, family comedy replacing One Man's Family, which has been expanded into a five-day feature; The Saint, who dundit formerly on CBS, to be replaced by a new series for Theater Guild at the behest of the sponsor, opening guests Soprano Bidu Sayoa and Conductor Fritz Reiner.

ABC, Jim Moore Musicals from San Francisco going in for romances drama; Fun House returning as a daily series.

Opponent's 'Generosity' May Be Trap for Extra Tricks.

"DO YOU KNOW," said George, "you've been so nice to me lately that I really feel like doing something for you. As a small token of my esteem for you I will let you have this trick free, gratis, and for nothing."

"Don't do me any favors," growled West. "I've had some of your gifts before."

West didn't know exactly what to suspect, but he was right to be suspicious. He knew from experience that George was most dangerous when he was apparently giving something away.

The situation in question was

George then played a low spade from the dummy!

A close examination of the hand shows that George had not been so generous after all. Play of the low spade from dummy, although it appeared to give up a spade trick to West, actually assured the contract.

It didn't matter what West led at the second trump. West dared not touch the trumps, so South was able to ruff the diamonds with dummy's trumps.

As the hand was actually dangerous when West apparently giving something away. The situation in question was

George took the king of diamonds and dummy's top clubs. He next cashed the ace of diamonds and ruffed a diamond in dummy. He returned to his hand by ruffing a club and ruffed his last diamond in dummy. He then cheerfully gave up two trump tricks to West, making his contract.

If the queen of spades is played from dummy at the first trick, East wins with the ace and returns his singleton trump. This allows West to win two high trumps and lead his last trump. Now South is doomed. He has almost lost three tricks and must lose one of his low diamonds. The king of spades of East is discarded for one of the diamonds, but the removal of all the trumps prevents South from ruffing any diamonds in the dummy.

It is interesting to note that East could not defeat Generous dummy. He returned with the ace. That would set up dummy's king and queen of spades, after which declarer would need no diamond ruffs.

Sportscaster Helped 2 Baseball Careers

Art Gleason, who is heard with Al Helfer on Mutual-Don Lee's "Game of the Day" broadcast, gets a big kick these days seeing two of his nominees for major league berths doing themselves well in the major leagues.

Art, years ago while doing microphone chores at Pacific Coast League games, recommended both Johnny Pesky and Joe Gordon for big league chances. The rest is baseball history. Gordon, after several successful years with the New York Yankees, is now the hard-hitting second baseman of the Cleveland Indians. While Pesky is the Cleveland third baseman of the Boston Red Sox.

Gleason, via the "Game of the Day" broadcasts, now sees these players regularly, and gets involved in those torrid postgame "We should have done this" sessions.
