TV Use to Fight Reds in Europe Gains Support

WASHINGTON, (AP) The State Department is warming up to the idea of using television for propaganda abroad.

It has ordered a special study of how the plan would work. Officials said the idea looks better and better and the department soon may ask Congress for money to start a pilot project.

Under the proposal, the United States would build television networks in such areas as Turkey, Indonesia, the Philippines, Japan or western Germany.

Americans would do the programming, with emphasis on educational and other films espousing democracy.

The United States also would have to furnish the TV receivers—projection-type sets designed to be viewed by 500 to 1000 persons at a time.

Mindful of the impact that TV has had in this country, department officials feel that its lure would be irresistible to peoples in backward areas. Some call it a propagandist's dream in which the audience would fall all over itself for a chance to see and hear America's message.

Sen. Karl E. Mundt (R-S. D.), suggested the idea.
