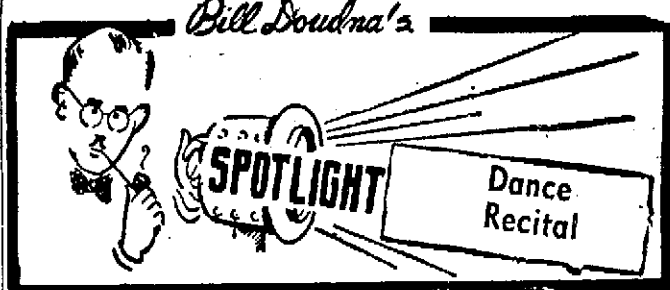
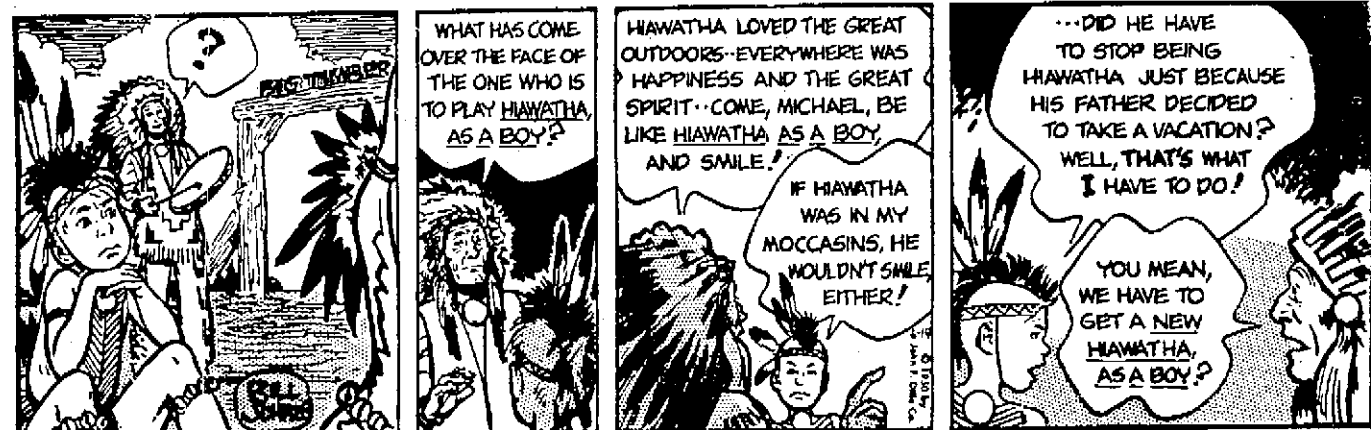


The Orbits

Lanny said. And as for the rest of the song, it just "grew" with the club. "They needed your tenor voice," a friend added. The emblem of the club is a whiffenpoof, a mythical bird-beast with feathered wings and a mermaid tail. The song isn't supposed to be sung outside the circle of seven and Lanny is inclined to look askance at its radio popularity. (Some Yale grads blow their tops every time they hear it on radio or video.)

The Whiffenpoof group originated in a famous New Haven restaurant, Mori's on Temple st., an address that has been immortalized in the verse that precedes the famous chorus: "To the table down at Mori's, To the place where Louie dwells, To the dear old Temple Bar we loved so well, Sing the Whiffenpoofs assembled With their glasses raised on high. And the magic of their singing casts a spell." All the headwaiters are and always have been hailed as Louie.

ART SHOW: A group of paintings depicting Minnesota present day life, collected last year to celebrate the Minnesota Territorial Centennial, is being shown through July 2 in both galleries of the Memorial Union.

SONG STORY: Much of the mystery and some of the legends inspired by Yale's popular "Whiffenpoof Song" have been cleared up by Lanny Ross, once a Whiffenpoof himself. "To begin with," he said, "the Whiffenpoof song wasn't even written by a Yale man at all. Most of the arranging as we know it now was the work of a son of Amherst.

The theme of the chorus ('We are little lost sheep that have gone astray, bah bah bah, etc.') was penned by Rudyard Kipling. His version, instead of being 'Gentlemen songsters off on a spree, damned from here to eternity, read 'gentlemen rancors.' Radio's version is 'doomed,' by the way."

The Whiffenpoofs, Ross explained, is an exclusive group that perpetuates itself by electing new members each year. They are traditionally seniors but Lanny, when
