## Smart Play Could Have Made 'Jinx' Hand Contract Pay Off

"THAT was a very unlucky hand," moaned Hard Luck Joe. "There was absolutely nothing I could do. If there'd been one more club in dummy I'd have been all right."

"Yes," sneered his partner, "and if you were a bridge player your name wouldn't be Hard Luck Joe. My three-year-old daughter was making hands like this last year."

Joe looked bewildered. He still couldn't see what he could have done to make the contract.

West opened the eight of spades, dummy put up the 10, and East next cashed the suit, allowing dummy to win the third trick.

South drew three rounds of trumps. After winning the third trick with dummy's king of spades, the correct plans is to draw only two rounds of trumps. Declarer then takes the top clubs and the ace of diamonds. A diamond is finally led from the South hand, and East wins with the queen.

At this point East cannot return a red card. Whether he returns a spade or a club, dummy ruffs with the last trump which has been so carefully laid there. At the same time, South discards his remaining losing diamond. South therefore makes his contract.

It does West no good to put up the king of diamonds on the second round of that suit. West's queen drops, and dummy's lack of diamonds is thereby set up.

South cannot be sure that this play will work. It will fail if East has a third trump. But there is certainly no harm in trying this play.

## Lutherans O.K. Record Budget

MINNEAPOLIS, June 23. (AP) The Evangelical Lutheran Church, in biennial convention here, will operate on an all-time record budget of \$4,200,000 for the next two years.

The amount, \$600,000 greater than the 1949-50 allotment, was approved by delegates last night. Funds were voted into the stewardship of the board of trustees for distribution.

A proposal for a \$400,000 church headquarters building, to be built in Minneapolis, was tabled until the delegates vote on Lutheran merger plans, coming up on the convention floor today.

The E. L. C. executive council already has approved a plan for union of the E. L. C. with the American Lutheran Church and the United Evangelical Lutheran Church.

## Judge Studying New Trial Plea by Judy Coplon

WASHINGTON, June 23. (AP) Federal Judge Albert J. Reeves, who sentenced Judith Coplon to prison last year as a spy for Russia, may announce Monday whether he will grant her motion for a new trial.

Judge Reeves took the motion under advisement yesterday after hearing Miss Coplon's attorney charge that the government had "deliberately concealed" wire-tapping evidence while the former Justice Department worker was on trial here for espionage last spring.

Federal Prosecutor John M. Kelley Jr. denied that the government's case was based on any such evidence.

Miss Coplon was sentenced to 40 months to 10 years in prison at that trial. She received an additional 15-year sentence after being convicted in New York of conspiring with Russian Engineer Valentine Gubitchev to relay U. S. secrets to Moscow.

## Stiffer Canada Spy Law Passes House

OTTAWA, June 23. (AP) The house of commons adopted a bill yesterday to strengthen Canada's spy laws, boosting the penalty for espionage from seven to 14 years imprisonment.

The bill gives the government power to prosecute anyone owing allegiance to Canada, including aliens within this country and to deal with Canadians who disclose official secrets even when beyond this country's borders.

Under Canadian law, an alien owes allegiance while he is within the realm, unless he is protected by diplomatic immunity.
