WASHINGTON, June 24. (AP) A few years ago, a pug-nosed Italian kid walked into the Jewish Community Center here, went up to Eddie Rosenblum and said: "I want to learn how to box, mister."

German Red Rule Grants to Czechs All Sudeten Area

BERLIN, June 24. (AP) East German Communists announced last night they had granted concessions to a Soviet satellite neighbor. The Red regime renounced all claims on the Czech Sudeten area.

Agreements signed in Prague by the Russian zone deputy premier, Walter Ulbricht, and the Czech premier, Antonin Zapotocky, also recognized as permanent and just the postwar expulsion of 2,000,000 Germans from the border area seized by Hitler in 1938 and returned to Czechoslovakia after the war.

West Berlin's anti-Communist press immediately denounced the deal as a new betrayal of the rights of Germans. Ulbricht was accused of an illegal assumption of power in presuming to deal for all Germany.

"Ulbricht betrayed the several hundred thousand Germans who still live in Czechoslovakia," said the newspaper Tagesspiegel. "Many of these are held in concentration camps."

"Every German government official has the duty to try to obtain justice for these people," Ulbricht did not do this. "This is nothing but treason, which one day must be brought to account."

The declaration by Ulbricht and Zapotocky said that East German and Czechoslovakia have no territorial claims on each other nor are there any claims for an alteration of the present frontier. That was not expected.

William N. Oatis arrived from London yesterday to head the AP's Prague bureau. His predecessor, Nathan Polowetzky, was expelled April 8 after the government accused him of unobjective reporting.

The AP denied the charge, which was not documented.

1000 North American Workers Donate Blood LOS ANGELES, June 24. (AP) One thousand employees of North American Aviation, Inc., each gave a pint of blood to the American Red Cross yesterday, the largest mass donation here since the war.

Seventy-five Red Cross workers set up facilities for the mass donation in a hangar at Los Angeles International Airport. Five station wagons transported the volunteers and from the hangar from 10:30 a. m. to 7 p. m.

Blind Entertainer Thrills Audiences in Tent Meetings

Paul Brown is the happiest man in Los Angeles County, according to his friends, because after 45 years he has found his life work. He is thrilling audiences in the canvas cathedral at Five Points, Norwalk, moving his sensitive fingers across the keyboard of an organ and bringing forth rolling drums, trumpets, and often what seems to be a whole orchestra.

This brother of comedian Joe E. Brown of Hollywood has been a successful entertainer since his high school days. He has been blind since 1934. During his years in the entertainment field he directed his own dance band and arranged music for many others.

Wee was invited to speak by unanimous request of the pastoral supply committee. He has been a minister of the morning service on previous occasions and is known for his interesting and challenging messages.

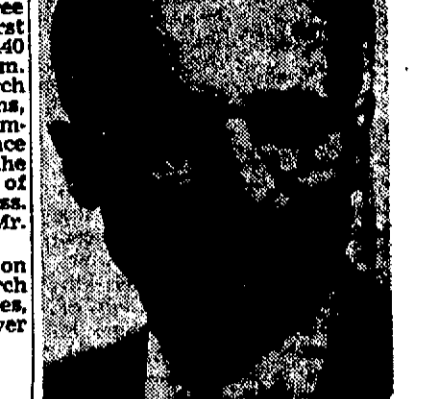
