

# North American Delegates to Join Envoys From 19 Lands at Church Conclave

THIRTY-TWO North American churchmen will join with Protestant and Orthodox representatives from 19 countries for the meeting of the 90-member Central Committee of the World Council of Churches to be held next Saturday through July 15 at Emmanuel Cottage, Toronto, Ontario.

Under the leadership of Bishop G. Cronley Oxman of the Methodist Church, New York Area; the bishop of Chichester, England, chairman of the central committee, and Dr. Frank C. Fry, president of the United Lutheran Church and vice chairman of the committee, the delegates will take action in defense of religious liberty on the basis of the report on conditions in selected countries where religious freedom is threatened. This will be in co-operation with the rally of world-wide public support for religious liberty as proclaimed in the United Nations Declaration of Human Rights. The annual session of the committee is one of the meetings of this governing body of the council between World Assemblies which are held every five years.

In connection with the recent announcement that the second assembly of the World Council is to be held at Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill., in 1955, the Toronto meeting will draw up preliminary plans for the subject matter of the assembly, the number and status of representatives who will attend, and the actions to be taken in preparation for the event. The first assembly of the World Council, held in Amsterdam, Holland, was attended by 500 delegates, 1500 alternates, consultants and visitors.

Other organizations affiliated with or part of the World Council which will be holding meetings in Toronto this summer include the Executive Committee of the

Commission of the Churches on International Affairs, Monday through Wednesday; the executive committee of the World Council, Thursday and Friday; the Interim Committee of the International Missionary Council and the Youth Department of the World Council.

On the list of American church representatives who will be present at the sessions is Bishop James C. Baker, Los Angeles Area Methodist Church.

Rev. Bruce Kurrle, pastor of St. John's Presbyterian Church, Compton, announces plans for the opening of the daily vacation Bible school to be held this summer at the church, Rosemeads, Elvert and Lime Ave. Starting on July 10 it will continue Mondays through Fridays and close on July 21.

Classes will be arranged for children from kindergarten to college. There will be two sessions, 9 to 11:30 a. m. for kindergarten children to 7 to high age, second session, 7 to 9 p. m. for junior high to college students. The former will feature drama, stories, play and treats. The latter will have speakers, motion pictures, trips and picnics. Registration will be on July 10, Rev. Kurrle said.

## Rev. Fred Ross Appointed to Pastorate Again

## Kroeger Findings Partly Supported by City Engineer

In a letter to City Manager Samuel E. Vickers, read in the City Council meeting yesterday, City Engineer Jess D. Gilkerson disagreed with the Kroeger reorganization survey report on several points and concurred with the recommendations on other proposals.

Gilkerson agreed with the Kroeger report in the matter of a reorganization of the Department of Public Works, recruitment and training of Engineer Department personnel, centralization of issuance of permits for building and alterations, centralization of many of the engineering services, the proposal that all purchasing be done by the purchasing division, and integration of engineering and technical services affecting utilities.

Among the suggestions made by the Kroeger report which are opposed by Gilkerson are the proposal that the Department of Building and Safety be re-established as a division of the Department of the position of traffic engineer to the Planning Department and reduction of the special projects budget.

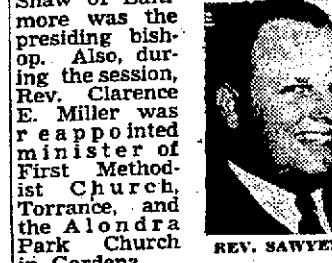
