### Return of 'DX' Fever

Remember when, in the early days of radio, just about everyboy was a DX fan? "DX" was a code term meaning distance, and the folks who were serious about their radio listening vied with each other over the number of dis-tant stations they could get. (I remember pulling in Huntington, W. Va.,

with a one-tube receiver.) Listening to local stations was considered

somewhat juvenile. If you lived in Madison, and a caller arrived, you switched quickly from WIBA or WHA to KDKA or WDAF; it was a matter of pride. Those were the days of the Kansas City Nighthawks and

Sam 'n' Henry, W. K. Hender-son and his \$1 coffee. With the advent and spread of network broadcasting, the DX fans faded out, except for the few enthusiasts who carried it over into "ham" oper-

ating and short-wave listening.

During World War II, there was a revival of interest in short-wave, but it didn't last long. Now, with the international situation again feverish, short-wave probably will have a come-

As a matter of fact, we spent an evening at our house listening to the rest of the world with a highly-developed, powerful, and portable set loaned by Harold Engel, who is taking it with him to the Philippines.

This receiver handles both long and short wave, operates on either battery or line, either AC or DC, and handles either 110 or 220 volts. It has two antennas-a collapsible one like your car radio's and a loop can be attached to a wall or window.

Using the collapsible antenna and 110-volt AC power, we logged stations in Europe, South and Central America, and Australia during the evening, besides U. S. outlets carrying the Dodgers-Giants baseball game for the overseas

We found the Russians and English all over the dial, with Moscow coming in particularly well. One English-language broadcast with two earnest announcers—a man and a woman—alternating in reading news reports and editorials from Pravda.

(This reminds one of the old story about the two leading Russian newspapers, Pravda and Izvestia. The story says that Pravda means "truth" and Izvestia means "news," and that a Russian commented: "There's no news in Pravda and no truth in Izvestia.")

The quality of the Russian broadcasts, from an engineering standpoint, was exceptionally high. One of the frequencies came booming in like a local station, with virtually no fading and little interference. As for the content, it wasn't very convincing, being chiefly the typical Russian concern with making everything Communist appear terribly legal, and making every-

thing else equally illegal. One can hope that the "Voice of America" is carrying the message of democracy to other lands with the force and fervor of the Com-
