Doctor Who Criticized His Profession Dies
CHICAGO (AP) — A doctor whose criticism of his profession cost him his Chicago medical society membership, died Tuesday.

He was Dr. Joseph A. Jergers, 70, author of the best-selling book, "Doctor. Here's Your Hat."

Largely autobiographical, the book assailed specialization in medicine and high fees. It appeared in 1939 and was condensed in national magazines and reprinted in five foreign languages.

The same year it was published the author was brought before the medical society on charges of unethical conduct and expelled. After a fight against the action, Dr. Jergers won reinstatement in 1940.

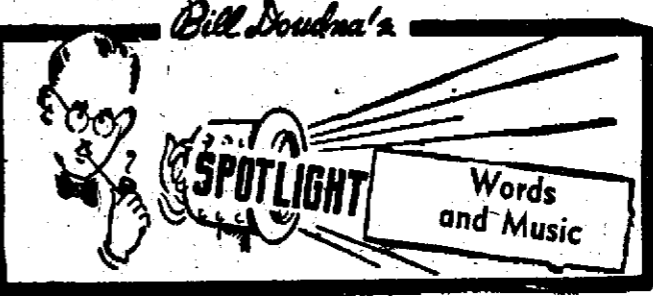

TIP OF THE MORNING: Mills Brothers' circus is on its Wisconsin tour. Dates include Delavan today, Burlington Friday, Kenosha Saturday, Racine Tuesday, Milwaukee Wednesday, Waukesha July 13, Baraboo July 14, and Tomah July 15. . . . Polack Brothers circus will be at La Crosse July 10-12 and Marshfield July 14-16.

Two University of Wisconsin groups—Wisconsin Players and the concert band—will begin their summer seasons tonight. The Players will present Robert Sherwood's "Idiot's Delight" at 8 in the Wisconsin Union theater. The band will give a concert at 6:45 on the Memorial Union terrace.

EMMETT R. SARIG will conduct the summer session band. The concert will be open to the public without charge.

MARJORIE PARKIN and DON SOULE, both of Madison, will play the leading roles in the Sherwood play—roles created by Alfred Lunt and Lynn Fontanne.

BUERKI directed the production, which will close Saturday night. A few season books are still available and will be sold until curtain time Saturday. Single tickets are also available for "Idiot's Delight."

ART: Drawings and lithographs by John Stuart Curry are on display until Aug. 1 at the Daniels gallery. The collection includes lithographs of some of Curry's most famous paintings, including "John Brown," "Elephants," "The Tornado," "Line Storm," "The Flying Codons," and "Prize Stallions."

LANDMAN: Lou Landman, former sports director at WIBA, now is a member of the sports department at WERC, Erie, Pa. He has two sports programs daily, and expects to cover some basketball and football games in the fall and winter.

ON TELEVISION: Two WHA alumni—Ben Park and Jean Mowry—are involved in a new show emanating from Chicago which has received unusually high praise from Variety and the Billboard. The program is "Hawkins Falls," a dramatic series on life in a small town. Park is producer and doubles as co-director with Dave Brown. Miss Mowry is a member of the cast.

Kenosha Raid Cases to Get Mass Hearings

KENOSHA—(U.P.) — Mass court hearings for 261 persons arrested in state-directed gambling raids last weekend will start Friday, Dist. Atty. Urban Zievers said Wednesday. The defendants originally were scheduled to appear in court Wednesday. Zievers delayed the cases because of the unusual number of defendants.

The raids on four gambling rooms were conducted by state beverage tax agents and Kenosha police.

After the raids, Gov. Rennebohm ordered state agents to clamp down on state horse race book making.

Asst. Atty. Gen. William Platz left for Kenosha Wednesday to aid Zievers in the prosecution.

Zievers said the 18 persons arrested on charges of running or working in a gambling house will be brought into county court.

The others, accused of patronizing a gambling house, will appear in municipal court.

The maximum penalty for conviction of operating a gambling house is a \$500 fine or six months in jail, Zievers said. The top penalty for gambling house patrons is a \$100 fine.
