

Insulation Offered Against Cold, Heat

WASHINGTON, July 8. (AP) — There are many ways to keep cool—such as gulping a Tom Collins, air-cooling the house or having mama make you a breeze with a palm leaf.

But the American Association of Nurserymen has come up with 10 new ways. Not only ways to chill off in summer, but how to warm up in winter.

The association starts off with a sort of weather report, which says: "In many areas of the country, the cold winds come from the north, northeast, and northwest, and south."

From there on, the association report is mostly nursery. About plants, that is. "You can, it says, 'curve plant' your evergreens and shrubs in the form of a high hedge. Then, the cold breath of winter from the north will skirt around the house and leave you snug and warm. Even save fuel, maybe."

SAVING ESTIMATED "This type of planting," the association says, "can save a lot of coal or oil. . . . If the windbreak reduces the wind from 12 to three miles an hour at 32 degrees, it will take only half that amount of fuel to heat your house."

Dr. H. E. Landsberg, the executive director of the committee on geophysics and geography of the U. S. Research and Development Board, conducted a lot of experiments on the plant-former deal.

He and other scientists found that the fuel combination is a little larger for a 12-mile wind than it is for zero and a three-mile wind.

Present Army Smaller Than '41 One, but Better Equipped, Says Johnson

WASHINGTON, July 8. (AP) The United States Army was smaller than it was when war came more than eight years ago, but Secretary of Defense Johnson says it is better equipped.

On Dec. 7, 1941, the Army had about 1,300,000 men, including what was then the Army Air Force. A draft law then in operation for more than a year. The Army now has some 593,000 men. (The separate Air Force has 350,000 men.)

The Marines have about 74,000 men. Combined with Army troops, this makes a total active land force of 667,000. In manpower this is small compared with Russia's active ground force. Military observers here say that 3,000,000 to 4,000,000 is a conservative estimate of the size of the Soviet army.

Russia's tank force is believed to be the world's largest. It includes some of the newest type tanks. Russian artillery demonstrated its excellence in World War II. Secretary of Defense Johnson has been insisting that our armed forces, relatively small though they are in number of men, "constitute a formidable force." He and other defense officials usually speak in terms of the Army, Navy and Air Forces combined.

CITIES TEAMWORK

Johnson says that their strength "lies in the degree of integration between combat forces and strategic plans, in the teamwork existing between these services, and the weapons and equipment available." In his last semi-annual report he said: "No weapons may

mean the difference between victory and defeat in war, and we have every reason to believe the United States is retaining its supremacy in that field."

The research and development board of the Department of Defense recently reported that it was coordinating 13,000 specific research projects into an integrated program. This has involved the expenditure of about \$500,000,000 a year.

Defense officials said in a recent report that "while the Navy eventually exercise control of atomic energy, our armed forces are maintaining their lead in scientific improvement of atom weapons; new weapons which may surpass in destructive power any arms previously known as being developed."

However, military men point out that it would take a long time to build up powerful armies with the reserve strength required for large-scale fighting in Europe or Asia. In World War II U. S. ground forces didn't get going strong until about two and a half years after Pearl Harbor.

The present Army of 593,000 constitutes an excellent force. The biggest ground force outside the United States is the 123,000 men under General MacArthur in the Far East.

It would take some time to transport any sizable reinforcements from this country to the Korea-Japan area. Owing to the comparatively small number of troops, sudden trouble in Europe would probably complicate the military problem.

The Army has a little more than 100,000 men in Europe. The largest force, about 85,000, is in Germany, about 10,000 troops are in Austria and 5,000 at Trieste.

Some 8,000 Army troops were recently reported as stationed in Hawaii and 6,500 in Alaska. Army forces in the Caribbean area—Puerto Rico and the Panama Canal Zone—number some 14,000. The United States has a vast reservoir of trained military manpower.

Veterans Administration figures indicate there are 15,370,000 living veterans of World War II. There are 2,259,000 in the youngest age bracket—20 to 24 years old—and 5,187,000 in the 25 to 29-year-old group.

In the 20 to 24 age group 171,000 are listed as drawing pay, leaving perhaps 2,000,000 still physically fit for service, allowing for deaths and other disabilities.

Perhaps 4,500,000 veterans in the 25 to 29 age group and 3,500,000 in the 30 to 34 age group could be prepared for service, although not necessarily combat service.

A large portion of the active commissioned and non-commissioned officers are battle-seasoned veterans. Most of the enlisted men, however, are not.

Pilot Bails Out of Fiery Plane in Korean Area

Southern Japan, July 8. (AP) An F-80 jet pilot was forced to bail out of his burning plane near Pyongyang, Korea, Friday but fellow pilots said today they believe he was rescued by American ground troops.

The F-80s reported considerable enemy activity about 12 miles south of Suwon, the Communist-held South Korean airport city about 22 miles south of captured Seoul.

Maj. Richard A. McNeas of Houston, Texas, reported a direct hit on a tank, and his flight also blasted what looked like a gasoline truck near Ansong, he said. Pilots on the mission included 1st Lt. John A. Martin of New York City, 2nd Lt. Jack G. Ricot of Chicago, Texas, and 2nd Lt. Robert J. Swartz of Butler, Pa. One pilot was killed on the base by the accidental discharge of a rocket.
