### Jefferson Tables Courthouse Plans

JEFFERSON—Jefferson county's proposed new \$750,000 courthouse became a victim of the Korean war Friday night.

Don Smith, Jefferson county board chairman, announced after a board building committee meeting that all plans for the building would be postponed because of the Korean situation and present world outlook.

Smith added that if the situation betters plans will get additional consideration.

Presumably tabled along with other details for the structure was Architect Frank Lloyd Wright's offer to design a new courthouse that would "put the county out in front of progress."

### McCarthy Submits Explanation of 1949 State Tax Return

The state tax department said Friday that Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy has submitted a detailed explanation of his 1949 interest payments which the department sought.

The explanation was asked last weekend by J. L. Tibbets, Application, assessor of incomes for McCarthy's home district, to complete the senator's 1949 state income tax return.

The senator listed \$15,172 in interest payments during 1949. He reported a \$17,120 income for the year, but paid no state tax because of deductions for the interest and for stock losses of \$2,250.

Tax Commissioner Arthur Wegner said Friday that detailed information was demanded "as routine" whenever a taxpayer fails to explain deduction for interest payments.

Wegner said McCarthy's return would be given a "routine office audit."

The senator's schedule listed payments to six relatives, six banks, and a finance company during 1949.

In Washington McCarthy said he had no comment on the tax matter.

### Mrs. Margaret Brown Leaves \$22,000 Estate

Mrs. Margaret Brown, widow of Madison's former first assistant fire chief, Patrick J. Brown, who died June 24, left her estimated \$22,000 estate to several Catholic organizations, two nieces, a nephew, and a sister-in-law, her will filed in county court revealed Friday.

Mrs. Brown bequeathed \$300 to Blessed Sacrament Catholic church; \$300 to the Most Rev. William P. O'Connor for public welfare work in the Madison Catholic diocese; \$400 to Boys Town, Neb., and \$200 to the Sisters of St. Vincent hospital in Toledo, O., where her brother was a patient.

She bequeathed her home at 1919 Madison st. to a niece, Sally Nielson, 1815 Vilas ave.; \$1,000 to a sister-in-law, Mrs. Margaret Brown, Brooklyn, N. Y.; \$500 to a nephew, Bernard Tuhey, Milwaukee, and the remainder of her estate to a niece, Mrs. Helen French, Milwaukee.

### Ike Calls U. S. Handling of Korean War 'Skillful'

MINNEAPOLIS—(UP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower Friday said the United States' entry into the Korean war and subsequent actions were handled as "skillful and firmly" as possible.

However, he said the Korean conflict was not full-scale war.

"North Korea must be getting outside help," he charged, "or it never could have attacked by itself."

Eisenhower was here to confer with Harry Bullis, chairman of the board of directors, General Mills, Inc.

**Cross Plains Youth Hurt in Bike Accident**

Kenneth Paar, 8, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Paar, Cross Plains, suffered head and body scratches and bruises Friday when his bicycle was struck by a car in Cross Plains.

He was treated by Dr. Walter Lappley, Cross Plains.

The youth rode his bicycle from between two parked cars and was struck by the car driven by Bertell Lawrence, 26, of 24 E. Johnson st., county police said.

### Madison Woman's Mix-Up Saves Her from Fatal Train

A Madison woman was safe at home today because she got "mixed up" and took the El Capitan steam locomotive train from Los Angeles on the wrong day.

Nora Severson, 215 N. Orchard st., a Madison dressmaker, had a ticket on the ill-fated Santa Fe railroad's El Capitan which jumped the tracks Thursday in Monica, Ill., killing nine persons, and injuring 70.

Though her ticket was for July 4 from Los Angeles, Miss Severson, for a reason, "I'll never be able to explain," got on the wrong train and took the El Capitan July 5, arriving in Madison Friday afternoon.

"I just got my days mixed up—I don't know whether it was a premonition or not," Miss Severson said.

"I found out I was on the wrong train when the conductor told me there were two persons with tickets for my seat, but he said he would be able to find room for me."

"When I saw the wreckage of the steamliner which left the day before mine did, I was awfully glad I wasn't on it."

Miss Severson went to Los Angeles with the Zor Shrine convention early in June. She was taking her first vacation "in many years."

### Jessup to Be Cleared of Pro-Red Charges

WASHINGTON—(UP)—The Democratic majority of the senate Communist investigating subcommittee has voted to give Ambassador-at-Large Philip C. Jessup a clean bill on pro-red charges hurled by Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy (R-Wis.) informed sources reported Friday night.

Informants said the two GOP members of the subcommittee—Sens. Bourke B. Hickenlooper (R-Ia.) and Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr. (R-Me.)—protested the clear-cut on the grounds the investigators had insufficient evidence to take a stand on the charges.

When McCarthy was told of the action he said, "operations whitewash is again rolling."

### Milwaukee Couple Indicted on Tax Count

MILWAUKEE—(P)—Michael Shapiro and his wife, Rae, were indicted Friday by a federal grand jury on charges of evading income taxes totaling \$99,996.

The indictment charged that the Shapiros evaded the taxes on Mrs. Shapiro's 1943 and 1944 incomes in the amounts of \$38,855 and \$61,141 respectively.

Shapiro is a former president of nine Milwaukee firms which deal in real estate, liquor, and construction. The couple live at their Beaver lake estate in Waukesha county.

A preliminary hearing is set for Monday before U. S. Commissioner Floyd E. Jenkins.

### Farmhand Loses Eye in Sprayer Accident

COTTAGE GROVE—Enoch Lundberg, 68, Cottage Grove farmhand, lost his right eye and suffered severe face cuts Wednesday in a pressure pump sprayer accident.

Lundberg was pumping up the pressure for potato spraying on the Dale Clark farm near Cottage Grove when the handle released and struck him in the face.

He was taken to Madison General hospital.
