Pack Freeze Forces Choice

By OSWALD JACOBY (Written for N. E. Service) Logical way is to let each couple be a partnership. Q. A player has taken the pack and added the top card to a meld. May he then ask permission to go out? Or, having made a meld, should he use his own discretion? A. He must use his own discretion. He is not allowed to ask his partner's opinion on the matter. If he melds and then asks permission, he must meld out. Q. The pack is frozen before either side melds. South discards an ace. West puts down two aces from his hand (he needs only 50 points for the first meld) and wants to take the discard pile. North and South say he cannot do that. They say that he must meld from his hand first before he can ever take the discard pile. In other words, if he puts down three aces or two aces and a wild card from his hand at this time, he can later take the discard pile. Is this correct when the pack is frozen? A. It is not correct. West was with his pair of aces. It is not necessary to have a meld down on the table before you can take the discard pile. You are allowed to take the pile after your initial meld, whether or not the pack is frozen. Mr. Jacoby is unable to answer individual questions on Canasta from readers. TV Sets Ended Night Out Fun, Wives Complain

LOS ANGELES, (AP) Housewives who have television sets almost unanimously complain that their husbands never take them out any more, a television survey shows. The family with television seldom sits on the set for reading, conversation, pleasure drives or evenings out. Dr. Edward C. McDonagh of the University of Southern California said. "The television family is changing from a social group characterized by the social isolation around the device to an audience sitting in the semi-dark and silently gazing at commercially sponsored entertainment," he said. Interviewers at every fifth home with a set report that TV owners say they talk only half as much as they used to, read one-third as much and go to one-half as many sports events. "Housewives were almost unanimous in their complaint that they never get to go anywhere any more," McDonagh said. Six S. C. graduate students in sociology served as interviewers for the survey, among them William Lahey, 3901 E. 10th St., Long Beach.

Helen Hayes tells me that she is taking a four weeks' vacation from her hit play, "The Wisteria Trees," beginning in late July. She is going to England. Then she is returning to Broadway to play again her tender, tragic role of Lucy Andree Ramsdell in this Joshua Logan play which takes Cherkov's "The Cherry Orchard" and places it in a Louisiana setting. This is the second time that Miss Hayes has played the role of a Dixieland gal. You will remember the name of her major hit was in "Coquette" in 1927. Betty Kidwell, of Columbus, Ohio Players Club, is causing some excitement around television row since she appeared on a "Big Story" show. Not only is she a good actress, but she looks exactly like Ingrid Bergman. How things change! The other evening King Peter of Yugoslavia and his party waited in the lobby of the Barbary Room until they could get a certain table which was already occupied. The diner for whom the king waited was a Broadway crooner. Composer Richard Rodgers says that it isn't necessarily so that the next musical show he and Oscar Hammerstein II are writing, "Anna and the King of Siam," will be filled with Oriental tunes. "We didn't overload 'Oklahoma' with a lot of western music, so there is no reason why 'Anna and the King of Siam' should be loaded with Chinese flutes and bells pa-pa-pa," he said. The opening of the newly being postponed until September when there will be more theatrical stars in town to participate in the ceremonies.
