



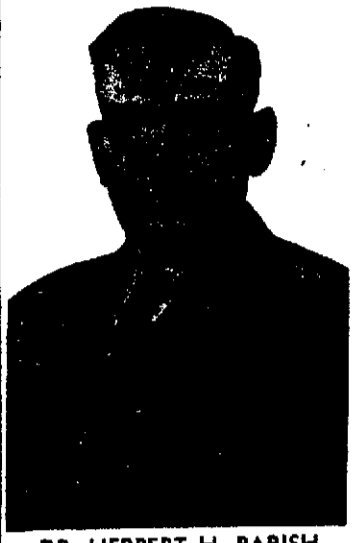
Church to Hear U. S. Temperance Director Speak

20,000 Baptists Expected Today at World Parley

CLEVELAND, July 22. (AP) Thousands of Baptists from the far corners of the earth opened their eighth international congress today, on the theme "And the Light Shined in the Darkness." Officers of the Baptist World Alliance have prepared for an influx of 20,000 persons for a six-day convocation of religious fellowship.

Late today a "parade of faith and freedom" will be the prelude to a giant program at Municipal Stadium tonight. This will be a colorful spectacle which includes a roll call, in costume, of delegates from four dozen nations. There will be a music program by a massed choir of 3000 voices.

Tonight, in addition to hearing a message from President Truman, who originally had planned to deliver it in person, the delegates will hear Dr. Edwin M. Neil, N. C., Baptist clergyman, educator and author from "The Basic Freedom."

President Truman, a Baptist, cancelled his personal appearance because of the situation in Korea. There were other themes of the opening day: "I am the Light of the World," a keynote address this afternoon by the Rev. W. L. Jarvis of Sydney, Australia.

Some Stores, Using Own 'Rationing' Systems, Curb Scare-buying, Hoarding

INFORMAL, modified rationing by department stores and manufacturers sprang up in scattered sections of the nation today as business, labor and government spokesmen stepped up their warnings against hoarding and profiteering.

Further price increases were reported, but they were countered by indications that Americans were beginning to believe authoritative statements that no real shortages in consumer goods were in prospect.

Leading department stores in New York discouraged panicky customers by limiting sales of towels, sheets, pillowcases and hosiery. The stores said they were instructing their sales personnel to use their own judgment in dealing with customers' requests, but admitted that the limitations amounted to a form of modified rationing.

MEAT FIRMS WARY The American Meat Institute said packers had instituted steps to crack down on potential profiteers in canned meats and were "carefully examining" orders for considerable quantities from "people not normally in the business."

Brown-Forman Distillers Corp., in Louisville, Ky., announced that it was reserving the right to allocate orders for whisky because of "apparent hysterical buying throughout the industry."

The liquor firm urged "sane"ness in buying and a realistic approach to the situation. On the other hand, small appliance stores advertised in Long Island newspapers that their customers should hurry to buy their washers, refrigerators and other appliances because shortages might develop.

DOZEN 'SPARE' TIRES At Iowa City, Iowa, Mayor Preston Koser and the Chamber of Commerce called a meeting to discuss methods of combating scare-buying. The mayor reported that in one instance brought to his attention, a man bought a new car and wanted 12 extra new tires to go with it.

Sowder, associate director of the Church World Service Department of Displaced Persons, left last Wednesday for Germany and Austria for an inspection trip of DP camps and resettlement processing centers. He is the guest of the International Refugee Organization, along with other members of the advisory committee of the U. S. Displaced Persons Commission.

The party will be met by an IRO representative in Germany, who will arrange the transportation and lodging. While in Europe, Rev. Sowder will confer with Dr. Edgar Chandler, head of the refugee operation of the World Council of Churches. The purpose of the trip is to give the directors of resettlement agencies an opportunity to examine first-hand the documentation investigation and transportation of displaced persons to the United States.

HOME BUILDING TIGHTENS AGAIN Materials Scarcity Back as Bugaboo

WASHINGTON, July 22. (AP) Home building has been going on at a fast clip. This is fine in normal times.

But now, with the country trying to build a military machine in a hurry, home building raises a couple of problems: New homes require a lot of materials which the government also needs, steel, for instance.

As the government takes some of these materials, making materials and new homes scarcer, the price on new and old homes goes up.

To put a brake on such price rises and still let the government get the materials it needs, President Truman this week did this: He ordered some of the government agencies which help people buy homes to make home-buying just a little tougher.

He could do this under laws already on the books, without need for new laws by Congress.

THREE AGENCIES He gave his orders to three government agencies: The Housing and Home Finance Agency, which helps civilians.

The Veterans Administration, which helps veterans. The Federal National Mortgage Association, called "Fannie Mae," which helps banks.

Taking them one at a time, this is what the three agencies do and what Mr. Truman told them they must do.

The Housing and Home Finance Agency not only insures banks against losses on loans they make to citizens to buy and repair homes; it also helps cities to build low-rental housing for low-income families.

The President has also ordered HFAA to tighten up all along the line—its insurance on loans and its help to cities.

The Veterans Administration has been guaranteeing lenders, like banks, on loans they make to veterans for home-buying.

In some cases, where veterans couldn't get home loans from banks, VA could make direct loans to veterans.

But the President has directed VA to be a little less generous with its guarantees and to use up slowly the money it has for direct loans.

The Federal National Mortgage Association buys mortgages from banks which have made loans to people so they can buy homes.

If the bank gives a borrower the right to take over if the borrower doesn't pay up on his loan, the FNMA was created because a bank may get too much of its money tied up in such mortgage loans.

If this reaches the point where the bank can't make any more such loans, home-building suffers.

If the bank will sell its mortgages for making more home loans, home-building would stay steady. And that's what the government wanted in peace time.

So Congress set up Fannie Mae to buy up mortgages from over-loaded banks and sell them to some organization which was willing to buy them.

(Mortgages can be sold and resold at a profit because any home-buyer who gets a loan must pay interest on it.)
