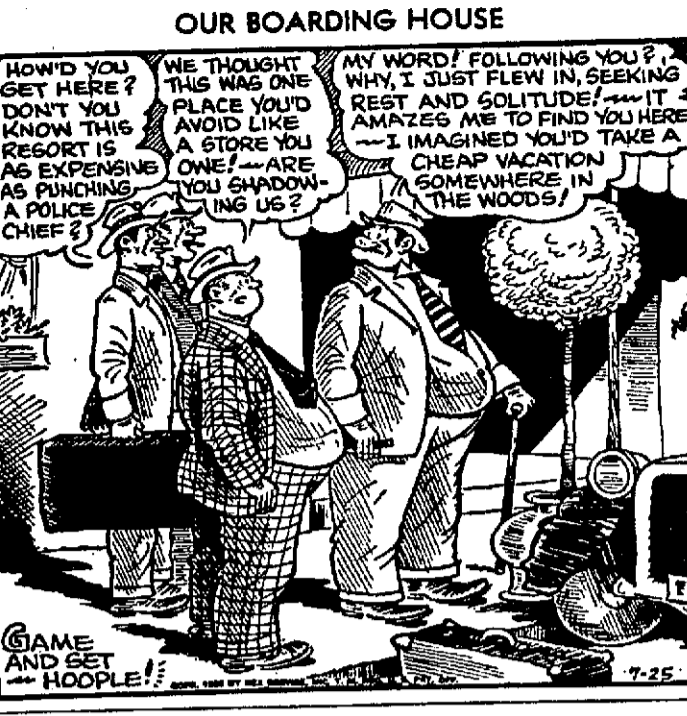

Poor Play Undoes Advantages Gained by Masterful Bidding

"Well," sighed Hard Luck Joe, "we have one consolation. We bid the hand right!" It is sometimes necessary to lead a high card for a finesse. For example, when you are short of entries to the dummy, the high card should be led. It enables you to hold the lead in dummy if the honor is not covered. When you have as many entries as you need to dummy, however, there is no need to lead a high card. The low card should then be led on the chance that the missing honor will fall on the first or second round.

Joe would have had no trouble in taking twelve tricks. "That's a wonderful consolation," moaned North, "but I have no right to complain. I ought to have my head examined for bidding a slam when I have you for a partner." "Ain't it the truth?" Joe assented, not without pride. "Other people get a break now and then, but I'm unlucky all the time. Do you realize that, with the spade finesse working, all I need is a 3-3 break in spades, diamonds, or clubs. Even if the spade finesse lost, I'd still be all right if either clubs or diamonds broke. The odds must be terrifically in favor of the slam."

In the play, West had opened the queen of hearts. Dummy won with the king of hearts, and Joe looked over the situation for a moment or two. Then he led the Jack of spades from the dummy. East won with the king and South won with the ace. Joe next cashed the queen and ten of spades, discovering that West still had a high spade. He then hopefully tried three rounds of diamonds and three rounds of clubs, discovering in each case that East controlled the fourth round of the suit. All he could do was take his ace of hearts and surrender the last two tricks. Do you think that Joe was unlucky? If not, where did he go wrong—in the bidding or in the play? Decide for yourself before you read on.

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Bomb Plotter Gets \$3500 Award in Work Injury

BOMB plotter William Ward will receive \$3500 compensation for injuries he received in a fall from a shipyard scaffold in 1946. Ward was convicted last year on three counts of attempting to blow up homes of Commission members because he thought they treated his claim unfairly. He was found insane and treated at Mendocino State Hospital until his release this month. Assistant Secretary John J. Batistich of the Industrial Acci-

dent Commission announced in Los Angeles that Ward had agreed to a \$3500 settlement of his claim, according to United Press. Ward told Beverly Hills Police Chief Levine Anderson that he would leave for Montana to work in mines after he received his compensation. Pending his departure, Anderson said, the state and Beverly Hills police will maintain guards over homes of Commission members here while Ward tried to blow up last year. Some of the dynamite obtained by Ward was found in the flood control channel here.
