Traffic Violator Given \$128 Fine

William R. Clark, 26, of 600 S. Brearly st., was fined \$128 and costs by Acting Superior Judge William E. Sieker, Friday afternoon for traffic violations July 1 when he outran a city police car.

Officer Kirby Harless testified that Clark turned the corner at Wingers dr. and Fish Hatchery dr. at about 70 miles per hour, drove through a section of Vilas park at the intersection, and then sped away on the Fish Hatchery dr.

Harless said he was traveling 30 miles per hour in the police car and was unable to catch Clark. However, he obtained the license number and the traffic warrants were served on Clark about a week later.

Judge Sieker fined Clark \$100 and costs for reckless driving, \$25 and costs for speeding, and \$3 for driving in the park. Another charge of driving under the influence of liquor was dismissed because of insufficient evidence.

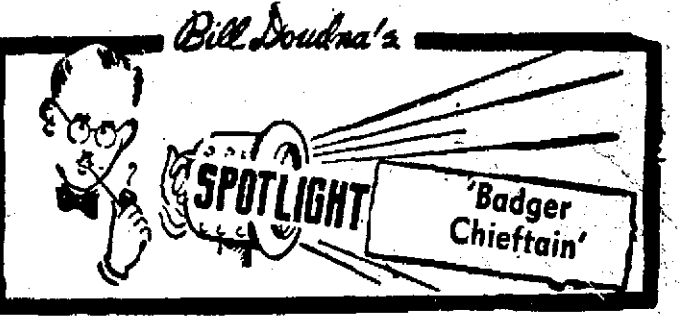

STORY: In a situation full of symbolism and magnificent scenery, an ill-assorted group sets out to climb the never-before-scaled peak of a Swiss mountain. The party includes an Italian girl with a strange fixation about the mountain; a Frenchman who identifies the ascent with his personal struggle with failure; an Englishman who comes out of friendship and for other reasons; a German determined to conquer at least a mountain; a faithful Swiss guide, and a casual American who goes along for the exercise.

HIGH POINTS: Before the troubled eyes of the villagers, the six set out for their mountain. . . separated and pinned down by a blizzard, the members of the party huddle on the mountainside and take turns bracing the tent poles. . . The Nazi makes victory over the White Tower a point of national honor and the American accepts the challenge. . . Sound characterizations, notably by Bridges as the German veteran. . . exciting development of the suspense. . . dramatic photography, much of it done in Switzerland.

LOW POINTS: The trite grouping of the party—the fault of the writer. . . failure of the movie to catch the spirit and motivation of the book—fault of the re-writers.

VERDICT: "The White Tower" is exciting as an adventure drama; disappointing when it essays psychological exploration.

STUDIO PLAY: Dress rehearsal of T. S. Eliot's "The Family Reunion" will be witnessed by an audience of special guests, invited by Wisconsin Players. The rehearsal will be at 8 p. m. Aug. 7 in the Play Circle of the Memorial Union.
