TV Showing U. N. Meetings, Front Fighting on Korea

NEW YORK. (AP) Television, lacking the flexibility of radio on a world-wide basis, nevertheless has been getting into the Korean picture. At the same time it has been doing things which radio would be unable to duplicate without a lot of tiring phraseology.

An example is covering meetings of the United Nations Security Council at Lake Success, making them available in their entirety to anyone within network range. These telecasts have run an hour or more.

The visible sessions heightened interest to a much greater extent than would be possible from a word picture of listening to the discussion via radio.

In this same category have been Senate committee hearings at Washington for consideration of intensified defense plans. These also have been relayed to the networks, mainly NBC and CBS.

As to the fighting areas in Korea, television, with no facilities for direct pickup, has been relying upon filmed scenes, taken either by its own camera men or obtained from other sources. The one precedent TV did establish in the current situation was the presentation of a President making a report to the nation in an emergency. That was the occasion of Mr. Truman's nation-wide broadcast last week discussing his message to Congress, when he also spoke before the network cameras. During World War II network television had not advanced to the point where it could transmit from Washington. The only points that could be hooked together were Philadelphia, Schenectady and New York, and then mostly on an experimental basis.

Otherwise, the video forums have been directing the bulk of their discussion to developments. Maps that give animation to the front line activity also are finding an important spot on television time.
