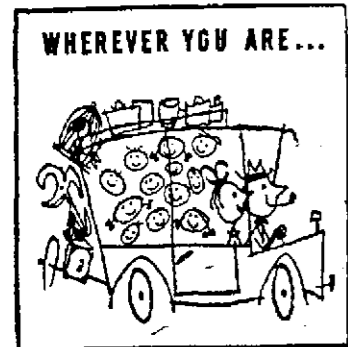

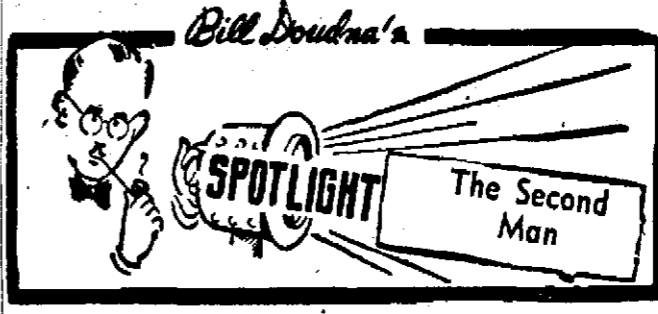

PICKLES

BREAD AND BUTTER PICKLES
Easy does it—crisp texture and attractive color

5 lbs. (about 4 qts.) medium sliced cucumbers
1 lb. (10 to 12 small) white onions
1 large green pepper
1 large red pepper
1/2 cup coarse salt
3 qts. ice water

Notes from Nancy Haven's BEET SUGAR KITCHEN

Jack Frost Grapes

Dip small cluster of grapes into slightly beaten egg white. Then dunk in Beet Sugar and dry. Makes a foamy garnish for desserts and salads.

Fruit Butters Can Use The Fruits With A Bruise

Cut apples, pears or plums in quarters; add just enough water to start cooking. When tender, put thru coarse sieve. To each cup fruit pulp add 1/2 cup Beet Sugar, 1 tsp. lemon juice, 1/4 tsp. each of cinnamon and nutmeg, 1/8 tsp. each of cloves and allspice. Cook till thick; stir frequently. Pour into hot, sterilized jars and seal at once.

Alternate: after mixture has come to boil on top of stove, place in a slow oven. This prevents burning and avoids frequent stirring.

NOW ABOUT VEGETABLES

Pickle The White Ones with whole spices tied in cheesecloth (remove before canning) and white vinegar to prevent discoloration. Beet Sugar Improves Flavor. Sprinkle it on sliced tomatoes. Add a tsp. of Beet Sugar to the cooking water of fresh peas and corn.
