'Larceny Lou' Demonstrates How to 'Legally' Steal GameBy OSWALD JACOBY

"HERE'S one that your friend East won with the ace of clubs," writes a correspondent from Lansing, Mich. "It wasn't so much a matter of doing anything unusually tricky. It was mostly a matter of allowing an opponent to put the noose around his own head and string him up."

"West opened the six of hearts, and South won in his own hand with the seven. He then rattled off four spade tricks, on which West discarded a heart, a diamond, and a club. South next laid down the ace of hearts, hoping to drop an honor. East discarded a low diamond, carefully saving his hand and putting up dummy's jack."

"South then led a club from his hand and put up dummy's jack. East won with the end of poor South since West could immediately take two hearts and lead a club to his partner's king."

"West naturally won with the 10 of clubs and that was the end of declarer goes after the suit he may have a finesse; and if you don't help him, he may take the finesse the wrong way. ent indicates some of the finest deceptive plays are more passive than active. You must sit tight and allow the opponent to make the mistake for which he is clearly headed. This sometimes obliges you to save just the right cards, for fear of revealing the true situation to your opponents.

The situation described in this hand is quite typical. When you have the ace-king of a suit, it isn't always necessary to take your top cards in a great hurry.

If declarer goes after the suit he may have a finesse; and if you don't help him, he may take the finesse the wrong way. Of course, this sort of play is much safer against no-trump than against a suit contract. All too often, if you fall to take your tricks, declarer will find a way to put your winning cards to sleep.


