Fails to Block Trip of Air Control Chief

County Supervisor Leonard J. Roach unsuccessfully attempted to block the proposed trip of County Air Pollution Control Director Gordon P. Larson to Salt Lake City Aug. 18-26. Roach claimed that Larson would be absent from the county during what promises to be one of the critical periods of the smog season.

When Roach was unable to get a majority vote yesterday, he indicated that he may ask Larson as a personal favor to remain here during the latter part of August instead of going to Salt Lake City on an inspection trip.

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Tournament Play Devised to Equalize 'Luck' Factor

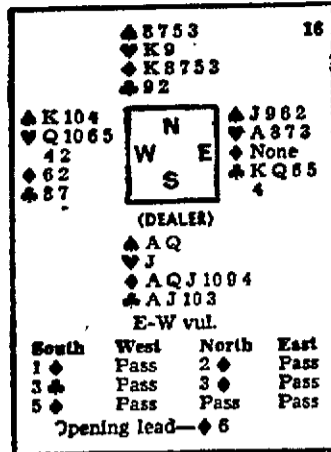

Tournament bridge is especially devised to eliminate the luck of the deal. Everybody plays the same cards, and therefore nobody can complain that he lost because somebody else held better cards.

However, there is always the luck of the human factor. You can play against an opponent who puts up a poor defense whereas some other competitor plays against an opponent who puts up an inspired defense. (These factors tend to even out so that a tournament is really a very fine contest of skill.)

Even when your opponents in a tournament happen to put up the best possible defense, it is still often possible to counter them with equally skillful play and thus restore the balance. The hand shown today is a case in point.

The contract was five diamonds at several tables, and in most cases, West led the five of hearts. This made things pretty easy for declarer. He played a low heart from dummy at the first trick, and East took the ace. This gave South a chance to dis-



City License Code Amendment Voted

An amendment to the license code to prohibit brake reeling in service stations not licensed to do brake work was authorized yesterday by the City Council, as recommended by its ordinance committee.

The council instructed the city attorney's office to study the possibility of increasing the license to be paid by wholesalers who truck merchandise into Long Beach, and who do not have an established place of business here.

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
