'Hard Luck Joe' Fouls Up Game and Loses Contract

"We almost made that hand, partner," said Hard Luck Joe. Joe would have made his contract if he had played it correctly. West opened the king of hearts, and dummy ruffed. Joe immediately cashed a diamond, and after ruffing a low club with the seven of spades and ruffing another heart with dummy's three of spades. He then ruffed another club with the eight of spades, and ruffed his last heart with dummy's five of spades.

At this point it was clearly evident to Joe that the cross-ruff could not be continued forever. In order to set the stage for another ruff in dummy, Joe led a diamond from the dummy and finessed the jack from his own hand.

West won with the king of diamonds and returned his singleton trump. If West had not held a trump to return, Joe would have

been able to ruff another diamond in dummy and therefore would have made his contract. This is what Joe meant when he said that he was not unlucky enough.

When West returned his singleton trump, dummy played the queen, East covered with the king, and South won with the ace. By this time, South had already taken eight tricks but he could win only one more. When he hopefully laid down the ace and a low diamond, East took the queen of diamonds, cashed the jack of spades, and returned his low heart. Joe could make only his last trump. Joe should have realized from

Col. Roberts New Aid to Harriman

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 22. (UP) Col. Frank N. Roberts, former chief of staff of a U. S. military mission to Moscow, has been appointed an assistant to President Truman's adviser on international affairs, W. Averill Harriman. He presumably will resign his position as professor of military science at the University of California at Los Angeles to accept the post in Washington Friday. Roberts formerly headed Lt. Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell's China-Burma-India theater intelligence office and was decorated for leadership during the sinking of the gunboat U. S. S. Panay in 1934.

U. S. Hospital Ship Listed With N. Korea

TOKYO, Aug. 22. (UP) North Korean Foreign Minister Pak Heung Yung has confirmed receipt of a telegram from U. N. Secretary-General Trygve Lie on designation of three American hospital ships, Pyongyang radio said.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 22. Los Angeles has had only half as many chickenpox cases this year as last. City Health Officer George M. Uhl reported 1455 cases to date, against 3375 at the same time last year.

Jailed in Pohang

TOKYO, Aug. 22. (UP) An intelligence officer at general headquarters was explaining to correspondents that he was puzzled about the location of one Red division—the Seventh. He said he would place the division definitely on the south coast except for one fact: "We have 18 or 20 prisoners from that division in jail at Pohang."
