Blackwood on Bridge

Here is a point that chronic two bidders often forget. If your partner does have enough to respond to your one bid, you can always make a second-round bid that is forcing the game. South dealer. Both sides vulnerable. North (Mr. Champion) ♠ 10 7 5 ♥ Q 7 ♦ J 6 5 3 ♣ K 8 4 3 West (Mr. Abel) ♠ East (Mr. Masters) ♠ Q 8 2 ♥ 9 8 ♦ 10 9 8 ♣ 6 2 South (Mr. Dale) ♠ A K J 6 3 ♥ A K J 6 ♦ A K J 6 ♣ A 10

He looked for a bid that was absolutely forcing. A jump rebid in new suit is such a bid. So Mr. Dale bid three hearts. Note that over the three-heart bid Mr. Champion bid three spades (not three no trump). With a hand as weak as his, there is a temptation to bid three no trump in this situation on the theory that it is a "weaker" bid than three spades. Mr. Champion had already announced a balanced hand, suited to no trump play and weak in high cards. By inference (his failure to raise spades on the first round), he had indicated he did not have full trump support for spades. No reason to tell Mr. Dale those things again. He had heard them the first time. Apparently Mr. Dale was interested in having Mr. Champion take a choice between spades and hearts. Mr. Champion properly cooperated. On this hand it might be argued that if Mr. Champion had held three cards to the queen in both spades and hearts, he would not have replied to a one spade opening bid and yet game would have been made (five spade tricks, four heart tricks and the ace of clubs). That is true, provided the spades and hearts broke favorably. But that is asking for two SPECIFIC high cards in partner's hand. It is an extremely favorable case. Here is the other extreme. Suppose partner had the other two queens in a hand something like this: ♠ 5 4 3 ♦ Q 9 8 5 ♣ Q 7 5 4 3. With that as a dummy, would you like to play a game contract with Mr. Dale's hand? Of course even the best players will occasionally open with a two bid and eventually go set at a game contract. They will also occasionally fail to bid game when it is there. But as a general rule I suggest that you reserve your two bids for those hands which will come within one trick of making game, without help from partner.
