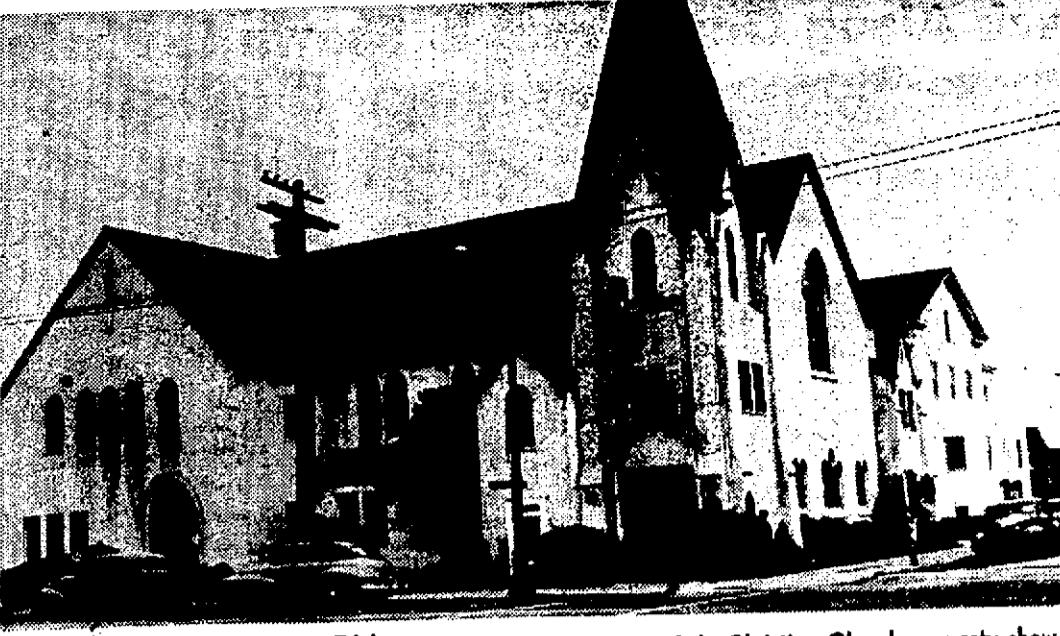

# East Side Church Noting 40th Year
