Bidding Was Correct, but Faulty Play Cost Contract

"Please settle an argument," requests a Hartford correspondent. "Noth claims he had a perfectly sound free raise to two diamonds. South claimed that the hand was not strong enough and that North should have passed. "South claims that it was this miserably weak free raise that got him to the unmakeable contract of three no-trump. He says he would have stopped below North except for the fact that North gave him too much encouragement. "In the play, West opened a low heart, East played the jack, and South won with the queen. South laid down the ace of diamonds and then led another diamond. Also, was North justified in raising to two diamonds?" North's free raise was very skimpy. Most experts would pass over one heart. However, some fine players do not take the free raise quite so seriously, and players of that school would probably consider the North hand worth a raise to two diamonds. The point is a very close one, and depends more on "style" than on anything else. As for the contract, it was not only very reasonable, but actually should have been made. South threw the first diamond trick with the ace. A careful study of the hand shows that South needs only four diamond tricks to make his contract. He can be sure of winning four clubs and the opening heart trick. In going after four diamond tricks, South's only consideration is to keep East out of the lead. As the actual declarer found out, it was fatal to give East the chance to lead hearts. Since South needs four diamond tricks and needs to keep East out of the lead, the correct play of the suit is well marked. After winning the first trick with the queen of hearts, declarer should lead a diamond to dummy's king. He should then return a low diamond from dummy and finesse the nine from his own hand.

N. Y. Boxing Returns to Air; Ex-Gilderleeve in New Role

NEW YORK (AP) Weekly boxing bouts, missing since last spring, resume their radio and television schedule with their return to New York's Madison Square Garden. Speaking for radio will be veteran announcers Don Dunphy and Bill Corum, with Jimmy Powers, sports editor of the New York Daily News, handling the video end. The sponsor is the same as in previous years. The fights went off the air in May when promoters and managers got into a squabble over the division of the money coming from radio and TV rights. After numerous meetings the managers won a substantial increase. Hal Peary, ex-Gilderleeve on NBC, will introduce himself as a new character, Honest Harold, when he starts his first CBS series at 7:30 Sunday evening. He will have that spot for two weeks pending the return of Amos and Andy, then will move to Wednesday night. Peary's old role is being continued on NBC, where it is portrayed by William Waterman. Stuart Erwin and his wife, June Collyer, have signed a sponsor contract to do a video family comedy with their two daughters, to run Saturday nights ABC-TV, starting in October. It will be produced on films in Hollywood. Hedy Lamarr has been billed for Ed Sullivan's CBS-TV show Sunday night to sub for Gloria Swanson, who advised the network she would be unable to appear because of illness.
