Long Air Mercy Mission Ended

EDMONTON, Alta., Sept. 22.—(AP) One of the longest mercy missions in the history of Canadian aviation today brought an ailing American from an isolated Arctic weather station to a hospital in Churchill, Manitoba.

A Royal Canadian Air Force Dakota covered 3650 miles to aid Charles Leroy Havens, of Berkeley, Calif., stricken with blood poisoning in the weather outpost 680 miles from the North Pole.

Northwest Air Command headquarters, here, reported the ski-equipped plane, carrying the patient and a crew of 11, landed at Churchill early this morning. Churchill is 1500 miles south of the Arctic Circle.

The plane was dispatched from Edmonton, 2150 miles to the south.

'Donating' Trick Paved Way for Bidder to Make Contract

One of the most remarkable hands played in a recent national tournament required nothing of some players but the ability to follow suit. In one case, however, declarer got a real workout.

The hand was bid to six spades at many tables, often on the bidding shown with the hand. This seems like a "stab," but the bid makes very good sense. After all, North has made a first hand vulnerable opening bid with not the slightest strength in spades and presumably very little (if any) strength in hearts. South is justified in believing that he will

find a dummy that is strong in the minor suits exactly what he needs for a slam.

At some tables, the opening lead was the four of hearts. In these cases, declarer finessed dummy's jack of hearts, driving out East's ace. They then ruffed the ace of hearts and later got a much-needed discard on the king of hearts. The hand therefore presented no problem.

In some cases, West decided that South was prepared for a heart lead and might not be prepared for a club lead. This was an unfortunate choice, since the club lead allowed South to win two of the three club tricks, making his slam with ease.

At one table, the West player chose the 10 of trumps as his opening lead. This gave no advantage at all to the declarer—none other than Generous George.

George took three rounds of trumps and then tested out the diamonds with the ace and king. He then had to abandon the diamonds since the suit was hopelessly blocked. If he had continued that suit, he would have won the fourth round in his own hand, with no way to get

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Ex-film Actress Gives Paris Look at Her Paintings

PARIS. (AP) Ruth (Dusty) Anderson, one-time cover girl and Hollywood actress, has invaded Paris' critical art world with an exhibition of her own American paintings. She's frankly scared.

She's out to prove a pretty girl can paint. What's more, she never studied art in her life.

Dusty, wife of Director Jean Negulesco, likes painting better than movie acting. "It's more satisfying," she told a reporter while preparing 15 of her latest paintings for the big show at the leading Drouant-David Gallery.

Negulesco, a painter himself, interested his slim, blue-eyed wife in painting about three years ago while they were on location for a film in northern California.

"At first I just dabbled around," said Dusty. "Then I got serious about it. Now I put in about nine hours a day at the canvas."

Dusty, who had a successful three-picture show in California two years ago, is frankly scared over her first big exhibition in Paris. "It's a test," she said.

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U. S. OIL LEASES BRING PROFITS TO MANY ANGELOS

Thousands of citizens have profited this year from liberal U. S. oil leases which are issued to those who cooperate in the effort to find oil on public lands.

Some have received very large returns. In Los Angeles, on an investment of under \$200, one man sold for \$150,000. For \$250 spent, one man got \$36,000. For \$250 one woman received \$250,000.

Among those who preferred income to a lump sum, one man who spent \$750 is getting over \$2000 monthly; for under \$500, another receives \$3300 monthly. Perhaps the biggest winner is the Glendale couple who spent under \$200, now get nearly \$8000 monthly—more than a million dollars worth of stocks and bonds usually bring. Any citizen may file for oil leases on public land. The big winners are careful to file in likely oil areas.
