Two Unneeded Finesses Cost Player Easy-to-make Bid

"Here's one for your Hard Luck Joe series," writes a Buffalo bridge player.

"South was unfortunate as only Hard Luck Joe can be. I am sure you will also find other similarities.

"West opened the jack of diamonds, and South won with the ace. He promptly led a heart to dummy's king, and returned the ten of spades from dummy to take the trump finesse. West won with the king of spades and returned a heart, knocking out dummy's ace.

"The contract now depended on the success of the club finesse. South drew the rest of the

won with the king of clubs, and the defense promptly cashed one heart and one diamond, setting the contract.

"Naturally South complained about his hard luck, and you can imagine how much sympathy he got. I am sure you will be delighted to know that there are Hard Luck Joes in Buffalo as well as among your own circle of friends."

I am afraid there are Hard Luck Joes everywhere that bridge is played. I can just hear this Buffalo dealer complaining bitterly about losing both finessees on this hand. The fact of the matter is that he didn't need either finesse!

As my correspondent hints, the contract was unbeatatable. If South had played it correctly, after winning the first trick with the ace of diamonds, South should cash the ace of spades and give up a spade trick to the enemy. This would leave both top hearts in the dummy.

"West might win, cash a diamond, and return a heart. Dummy could win with the king of hearts, and declarer could then draw trumps. If he chose, he could land in dummy on the third round of trumps in order to take the club finesse. But he could even take the third trump in his own hand to develop the clubs without a finesse.

The defenders, in either case, could take the king of clubs, but would never get a heart trick. The ace of hearts would still be in dummy to stop that suit and to give declarer an entry to the long clubs. South would naturally discard his losing heart on one of dummy's clubs.

Mobile Radio Unit Sent to War Zone

NEW YORK, Sept. 23. (AP) A complete mobile radio communications station has been assembled and dispatched to the Korean fighting front by R. C. A. Communications, Inc. It was announced today by Harry C. Ingles, president.

Ingles said operation of the R. C. A. station in Korea will relieve Army facilities of much of their burden of press, government and personal messages they now have to handle. At the same time, it will enable men in front line forces to communicate with their families by direct radio-telegraph service.

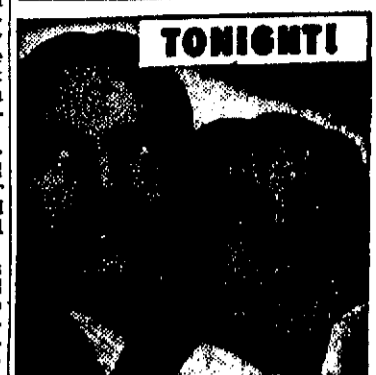
The unit, assembled at the request of the United States armed services, includes facilities for radio-telegraph, radio-photo and voice program service, as well as regular telegraph service.

The mobile unit has been housed in Army-type trucks and trailers that can be moved to meet Army requirements. Sixteen radio operators and technicians will be on duty with the unit, providing 24-hour service for handling direct radio communications with San Francisco, and, via this route, to other countries.
