NEW YORK, Oct. 5. (AP) A group of representatives of the General Federation of Women's Clubs returned from Europe yesterday and said they were pleased with the way the Marshall Plan is operating.

Delos W. Rentzel became chairman of the Civil Aeronautics Board (CAB), which makes and judges compliance with the rules of flying. He succeeded Joseph J. O'Connell Jr., who resigned July 8.

Donald W. Nyrop became administrator of civil aeronautics, the post formerly held by Rentzel. Nyrop had been his deputy. The Civil Aeronautics Administration (CAA) operates the nation's airways and airport control towers and enforces the rules made by the CAB.
