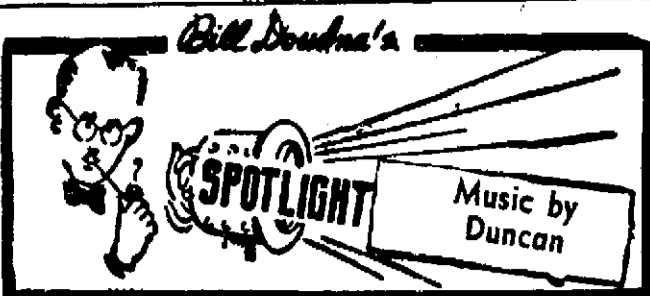

Bryan Duncan, the remarkable blind pianist who plays music by Handy and Chopin with equal ease, will offer some of the most popular works in the piano repertoire when he gives a recital at 8 p. m. Thursday, Oct. 19 in West high school auditorium.

Duncan has become familiar to Madison audiences through his playing at the Hoffman House—where he has been an attraction for several months—and over WISC and WISC-FM. He came to Madison from an 11-year (that's right—11-year) engagement at the Hotel Chicago.

Assisting artist will be Gordon Haldiman, blind trombonist who won first place in the 1944 and 1946 Chicago Music festivals and who was soloist with the University of Wisconsin Concert band while he was a student. For the past four years, he has studied with Jaroslav Cimer, soloist and composer.

Proceeds of the concert will be used to buy equipment for the sight-saving department of the Madison public schools. Tickets are on sale at Rennebohm drug stores.
