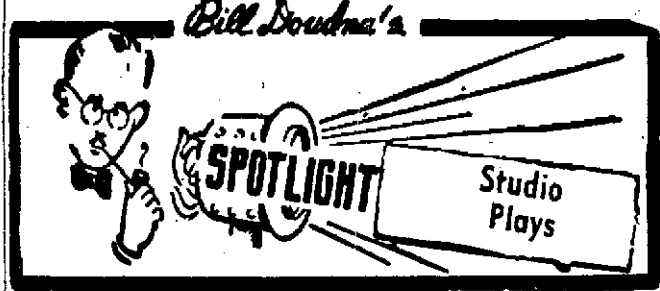

Comedy fared better than tragedy at the Play Circle Tuesday night when Wisconsin Players and the Wisconsin Union theater committee presented their first studio plays of the season. The plays were Shaw's "The Dark Lady of the Sonnets," Synge's "Riders to the Sea," and Coward's "Fumed Oak," performed in that order. They will be repeated today at 3:30 and 8 p. m.

Synge's dark tragedy of the Irish seacoast suffered from Director Glen Petter's pre-occupation with rhythmic movement, whose slow tempo and easy grace contrasted sharply with the rapid and sometimes staccato speech of some of the actors. Only Delores Kosbab, as the mother who had given all her sons to the sea, matched the timing of the action.

Here is a young actress to watch: she gave a sensitive characterization and showed at times rich and mellow voice which can become a consistently fine one. Another performer to keep your eyes on is Martin Tabse, who played the vain and flattering Will Shakespeare of the Shaw play about the playwright's accidental meeting with Queen Elizabeth. It has high spots of comedy, turned beautifully by Tabse's humor-sensory reading of the poetic lines.

Believe it or not, when George Sanders hits Manhattan, there's a good chance of his taking the Edio Pinza role in "South Pacific." Most people don't know that Sanders' agent, who replaced Pinza in "S. P.," Marilyn Erskine, currently making a hit in "Strictly Dishonorable" on stage here with Caesar Romero, was once wed to producer Stanley Kramer. They ended it all with annulment.

Sol Lesser has signed Josh White for a good role in "Tarzan of the Apes," with Lex Barker. They're looking for a new "Jane" for Tarzan.

Nancy Sinatra and Bob Walker are making with the dates. Don Taylor gets a hot one day off between finishing "Prisoner of War" at Universal and leaping to Metro to play opposite Liz Taylor in "Father's Little Dividend." Alexander Knox and spouse leave next week for England where he'll do a play. They expect to be gone a year.

It's been a long time since we've seen such a star turn-out as came forth for the premiere of "Harvey" t'other night. Sounded to us like the fans in the bleachers gave the biggest hand to Janet Leigh and her date, Tony Curtis, as they emerged from his car. Others we saw were Roy Russell, the Robert Cummings, Danny Kaye, the Jack Bennys, authoress Mary Chase, Eleanor Parker, Shelly Winters, wearing the lowest-cut gown of 'em all, with Dan Dailey, the estranged Richard Greene and Patricia Medina together, starlet Pippa Laurie with Howard Duff, Victoria Horne, who does some good comedy in the film, with Jack Oakie. (We'd bet you these two have long since tied the knot—secretly, that is.) "Harvey" is sheer delight in its screen version. Don't miss it. P. S. Bill "Hopalong Cassidy" Boyd was almost the only feller in the audience in a blue suit instead of a Tux. But his sun-tan against his white hair was so striking, it almost stole the show! The Boyds, who seldom nightclub, went stepping out to Ciro's later.

FILM FARE: Edith Gwynn's Hollywood report says: Randy Stuart (that's a GIRL) gets her biggest break to date with the role just handed her at 20th-Fox. She'll be Susan Hayward's sister in "I Can Get It For You Wholesale." Blonde Randy once played in a girl's orchestra and was in tent-shows like Jennifer Jones. Dismiss Motion
State Asks Action in Transport Case
Federal Judge Patrick T. Stone took under advisement here Tuesday a state motion to dismiss the General Wisconsin Transport Co. injunction suit against Ben Marcus, director of the Wisconsin motor vehicle department. Stone, who previously had granted a temporary order restraining Marcus from prosecuting the company to enforce payment of state registration fees and ton-mile taxes, offered his tentative opinion that the firm had a "valid right" to move its corporate structure from Wisconsin to Illinois to obtain the benefit of lower taxes as a matter of "good business."
