THAT'S NO SALUTE, CONGRESSMAN

Explorer Scout on Stamp Just Surveying Scene

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20. (AP)—The new Boy Scouts of America commemorative stamp shows a khaki-uniformed youngster with his left hand on his brow. The post office department has received letters saying the Scout is saluting with his left hand instead of his right. And besides, he isn't giving the proper three-fingered Scout salute. But Postmaster General Jesse J. Donaldson says he knows the proper Scout salute. The youngster isn't saluting at all, he said. He's just shading his eyes. "This Scout depicts the highest age level program of the Boy Scouts and the position is typical of an exploring Scout shading his eyes," Donaldson told Representative Francis Case (R-S. D.). Three Scouts are shown on the stamp but only one, the eldest, has assumed a position which "might be mistakenly taken" for a salute, Donaldson said. Aid to Representative Case said he had called the apparent error to Donaldson's attention.

Red Press Raps N. Y. Politics as Corrupt

MOSCOW, Oct. 20. (AP)—New York's torrid political campaign hit the front pages of the Soviet press today. In detailed accounts of the "Hanley letter" episode, the Soviet press said this was proof that Gov. Thomas E. Dewey is a "puppet of Wall Street." However, the Soviet newspapers are impartial in their treatment of the campaign. The headlines here: "Corruption in the Democratic and Republican parties."

Lehman Has No Apology for His Defense of Hiss

PUBLICATION of a second personal letter by a candidate for the Senate kept national political attention focussed today on the heated New York campaign. Sen. Herbert H. Lehman (D-Lib.-N. Y.) said he had no apology to make for a two-year-old letter in defense of Alger Hiss, former State Department aid since convicted of perjury. Lehman noted it was written before Hiss' indictment. Lehman's letter was made public while controversy still flew about a letter written by Lehman's Republican opponent, Lt. Gov. Joe R. Hanley, which Democrats contend showed Hanley was "paid off" to run for the Senate rather than the governorship. TRUMAN COMMENTS President Truman told his news conference yesterday he had read the Hanley letter and was sorry he had. It is too bad a thing like that has to come out in public, the President said. He added that, yes, it certainly would have an effect on the New York election and won't hurt Democratic chances. Mr. Truman also said he expects the Democrats will win next month's Congressional election by a landslide, increasing their majorities in both Senate and House. He doesn't plan to do any campaigning, he said. He wouldn't comment on election prospects in individual states, but said he hopes Sen. Francis J. Myers wins in Pennsylvania. Myers is opposed by Republican Gov. James H. Duff. INQUIRY DEMANDED A demand for a Senate investigation of "sordid deals" in both Republican and Democratic parties in New York came from Arthur Schutler, executive secretary of the American Labor party in the state. He said he acted for John T. McManus, the party's candidate for governor. He sent a telegram to Sen. Gillette (D-Iowa), chairman of a Senatorial elections committee. Gillette said he would go to Washington to investigate. In Baltimore, Democratic Sen. Tydings took to the air to refute charges of radio commentator Fulton Lewis Jr., that his handling of the investigation of communism-in-government charges is "catching up" with him. His 15-minute rebuttal was to have been nationally broadcast starting at 7 p. m. but the Mutual Broadcasting Co., which carries Lewis' commentary, said line trouble kept it off the national network for about 3 1/2 minutes. MORE TIME OFFERED The network offered Tydings another 15 minutes of free air time. So did Lewis. The Maryland Senator, running for a fifth term, denied that the Communist inquiry he headed has had any bad effects on his campaign and he added: "On the contrary, I believe that the people... are becoming fully acquainted with the complete political character of the smear campaign intended to spread the impression that a conscientious job was not done in the investigation."

Gasoline Sales Hit New August Peak

SACRAMENTO, Oct. 20. (AP)—A new August high for gasoline and other fuel distribution was chalked up in California this year, the State Board of Equalization reports. The board attributed the boom to heavy vacation travel and the Korean war. The total gallonage for the month was 324,404,666, or about 8.3 per cent above August, 1949. Tax collections totalled \$14,107,315, but \$1,230,795 of this was refunded because the gas was used off the highways.

Zone Law Revise Includes Fences

An amendment to the zoning ordinance to include regulation of fence heights has been recommended to the City Council by the planning commission. That will make it possible for the commission to permit exceptions where a certain height of fence would work a hardship. The measure provides that a fence, wall or hedge in a residential zone shall not be more than six and one-half feet in height. Such a height limit would apply to side and back yards where the distance from either side of the proposed fence, wall or hedge to a building wall is six feet or more. It would not apply to residential lots in a business or industrial zone, where there would be no height limit.
