G. O. P.'s Work Cut Out in N. M. Races

(Sixth of a Series) By FORREST O. EDWARDS

SANTA FE, Oct. 21. (AP) Republicans are hoping to break the Democrats' 20-year monopoly on New Mexico's two congressional seats this year with two comparatively unknown candidates.

A number of Republicans privately are expressing their doubt that the trick can be turned this year. Their candidates are pitched against two successful Democratic office holders, known over the state.

Both representatives are elected at large. Both races were settled by less than 10 per cent of the vote in 1948.

Democratic candidates this year are incumbent A. M. Fernandez, who has served four terms, and former Congressman John J. Dempsey, 71, who has had three terms as representative.

As a district attorney, Armijo has prosecuted a number of cases involving malfeasance in office. He is taking the "businessman" approach.

"The professional politician," he has said, "has little awareness of the experienced men of the job." The Republicans are appealing to the voters to "elect a businesslike approach to government" and a public official (Armijo) with a record of "persistence in ferreting out law violators."

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U. C. Regents Ask Loyalty Signing, but Rap Solons

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 21. (AP) The University of California board of regents today asked all university employees to sign the state's new anti-Communist oath but slapped at the California Legislature for infringing on the regents' governing power.

Fourteen of the 24 regents were present at a meeting yesterday and took the oath. But they unanimously voted down a resolution to withhold salaries of university personnel who refused to sign the oath.

The regents challenged the authority of the State Legislature to dictate to the university's eight campuses. Previously the regents were adamant in their demand that all university employees affirm to their loyalty statement.

They asked their attorney to investigate a test case of the oath law in relation to the university. The new law demands that all state, county and local public workers take the oath.

The American Civil Liberties Union, urged by more than 50 San Francisco employees, including some teachers, said it will challenge the constitutionality of the oath in a test case.

At least 10 employees in areas surrounding San Francisco have signified intention to ignore the oath. This choice will forfeit their jobs.

Three Killed as Car Is Struck by Train BARSTOW, Oct. 21. (AP) A Santa Fe passenger train and an automobile collided at a crossing near here last night, killing the three occupants of the car instantly.

Deputy Coroner Ed Doyle identified the dead as John P. von Blon, 20; A. L. Schooner, 48, and Bailey V. Coleman, all of Yorba, Calif.

Red Officer Dies MOSCOW, Oct. 21. (AP) The death of Soviet Col. Gen. Gavril Zashikhin, 52, was reported today. Zashikhin served in the Russian army from 1918 when he enlisted. During World War II, he commanded large army units at Leningrad.
