State Peace Officers Hear Warren Laud Crime Control

PASADENA, Oct. 26. (AP) Supervisor William C. Sullivan of the Federal Bureau of Investigation addresses 800 lawmen today at the 30th annual convention of the State Peace Officers Association.
 The three-day session opened yesterday with Gov. Earl Warren as guest of honor. Pasadena Police Chief Clarence Morris and Los Angeles County Sheriff Eugene Biscailuz were cohosts.
 Warren told the group that California has one of the finest law enforcement organizations in the nation, despite the rapid increase in population.
 "Since 1940 our state has added 3,500,000 people and some of them were attracted here as a profitable place in which to try to live by their wits," he said.
 "Despite that, however, law enforcement officials and officers have kept our crime down to an average level."
 Outgoing President Sheriff Daniel C. Murphy of San Francisco presented Police Chief J. D. Holstrom of Berkeley as incoming president.

N. Y. Continues Roundup of Hoodlums Before Election

NEW YORK, Oct. 26. (AP) Hundreds of detectives, working around the clock, today rounded up more small-time hoodlums and shady characters who might use strong-arm tactics on election day.
 Police Commissioner Thomas F. Murphy said the dragnet would be continued day and night.
 The roundup started Tuesday night on orders of acting Mayor Vincent P. Impellitteri, and by midnight last night 232 prisoners had been arraigned in a special court.
 Police continued the roundup throughout the night, arresting 74 persons. In addition, others picked up were released after questioning.
 All those arraigned were charged with vagrancy—not having a visible legal means of support. More than 80 per cent of those rounded up by 700 roving detectives were men with previous police records.
 Most of those arrested were small fry, but some were found to be wanted by other states or the federal government. Among them were narcotics addicts, petty gamblers, poolroom hangers-on and policy game runners.
 Of the 232 arraigned, all but seven either were sent to jail or were forced to put up bail. The seven, who had no police records, were paroled.

Battalion of Dutch Embarks for Korea

ROTTERDAM, Oct. 26. (AP) A battalion of Dutch volunteers left today for Korea aboard the 10,000-ton Victory ship Zuiderkruis. They are due in Pusan in about six weeks via Port Said, Aden and Singapore.
 The bulk of these Dutchmen are former members of the Royal Dutch Indies Army. Their commander is 45-year-old Lt. Col. M. P. A. Den Ouden, a veteran of tropical warfare and guerrilla fighting in Indonesia.
