GI'S WOULDN'T LIKE IT THOUGH

R. O. K. 'C' Ration Keeps Army Going

U. S. EIGHTH ARMY HEADQUARTERS, Korea. (AP) The Republic of Korea (R. O. K.) doughboy has his own native version of GI Joe's famous combat ration.

GI Kim, the typical South Korean infantryman, seems to like his new "C" rations. But if an American soldier were handed a package of this, his reaction probably would be: "Whaddaya do with it, anyway—fire it from a mortar?"

Then he would munch green peas and beans for dessert instead of gulping canned fruit cocktail and coffee.

These might be strange and unacceptable to his palate but they are staple items in GI Kim's diet. His "C" rations contain such other delicacies as rice starch to be kneaded with water into a thickish paste, dried cuttlefish and kelp—or seaweed.

The only things in the package familiar to American troops are salt cubes, sugar and three sticks of chewing gum.

The R. O. K. troops are really fond of the gum, said Lt. Col. William F. Runge, Sanford, Fla., of the Korean military advisory group.

Runge is senior U. S. adviser to the South Korean army's quartermaster general. He helped develop the new field rations, based largely on a study of South Korean habits made some years ago by a Japanese scientist.

The emergency rations, small in bulk, were designed to be eaten uncooked and still be tasty and nutritious enough to give R. O. K. soldiers the energy they need to fight.

An individual ration, clad in waterproof plastic, weighs about four pounds and provides one soldier 3210 calories a day. Runge said about 600,000 packages a month will be ordered.

"That gives enough to feed 75,000 front-line troops eight days a month on an emergency basis," he said.

R. O. K. troops behind the lines, who can cook food without danger, will continue to get the usual ration.

Relatively, the R. O. K.'s have done as well or better than GIs in the matter of getting a balanced diet," said Runge. "Each soldier eats about a pound and a quarter of rice. But he also has canned fish, dried fish, wheat flour, rice flour and flavoring as well as a great assortment of fresh vegetables."

And GI Kim is a practical soldier himself. He gets vitamins as he marches, picking onions from the field and apples and pears from the trees. If there are germs on them he doesn't worry. Nobody ever told him the difference between a germ and a geranium.
