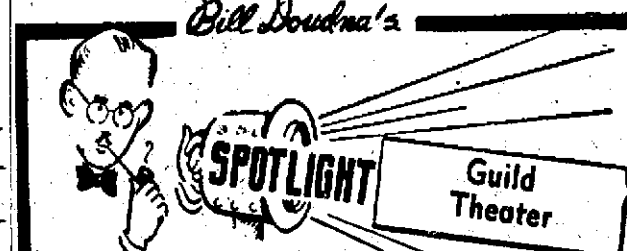

Duane L. Turner, Madison fireman with No. 7 company, was reported in "much improved and fairly good" condition Thursday night at Madison General hospital where he was taken Thursday after collapsing while helping fight a rubbish fire in a ravine at Calvary cemetery.
