

# Wide Election Coverage on TV in East Tonight

By WAYNE OLIVER NEW YORK, Nov. 7. (A) Tele-

vision will take election tables and charts into nine million liv-

and charts into nine million living rooms tonight in its first large-scale coverage of the blennial battle of ballots between Democrats and Republicans.

The telecasters gave the 1948 election a good whirl, but there were only 37 stations in 23 cities then, broadcasting to 718,000 sets. Now there are 107 stations in 65 cities, and 9,000,000 sets in use. Radio is geared for its usual night-long, intensive coverage but Radio is geared for its usual night-long, intensive coverage but due to television's growth, is hardly likely to have any greater audience than last time.

The American Broadcasting

The American Broadcasting Company's television election plans are similar to those it used successfully two years ago—simply turning the television cameras on its radio newsroom. You see as well as hear the commentator see the tables and charts tator, see the tables and charts in the background, and catch the tense, exciting atmosphere of the newsroom. Like other networks. ABC will take the viewer around ABU Will take the viewer around to various campaign headquarters and, as the returns become decisive, try to bring victorious candidates before the cameras.

candidates before the cameras.

NBC has set up a special video newsroom with charts, diagrams and other visual aids. It also plans pickups from rival head-quarters in New York, and direct reports from around the netreports from around the net CBS' television election cover-




