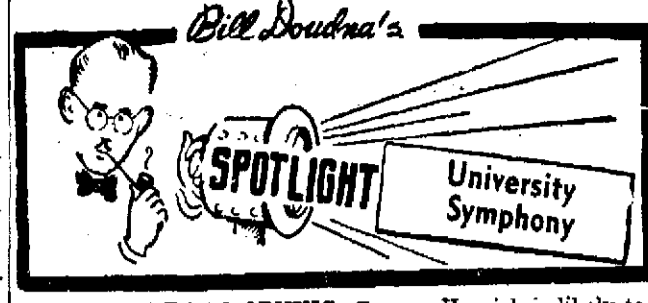

SPOTLIGHT University Symphony TIP O' THE MORNING: Tommy Henrich is likely to be the next sports figure to have his own radio show...

Drama, illustration, fireworks, and grandeur-in-the-abstract comprised the program with which the University of Wisconsin Symphony orchestra opened its season Sunday night.

With the flexible conducting of Prof. Richard C. Church and the often prodigious playing of Cellist Ernst Friedlander, the concert in the Wisconsin Union theater was highly successful.

It had an evenness new to campus orchestras, each of the vastly varied works receiving equally competent handling. Most noticeable, perhaps, to those who have followed this organization for many years—under Morphy, Dalley, Bricke, and Church—was the remarkable consonance of the violins, which in nonprofessional orchestras are likely to lack this quality.

It was particularly apparent in Sibelius' Seventh symphony, which often calls for a resonant set of strings against brass or woodwinds. This was a most unusual work—a symphony in one movement, in which early themes carried through to the end. It had an epic sound, which was its greatest demand on the performers.

Friedlander's solo appearance was in Tchaikovsky's "Variations on a Theme," full of beautiful melody made more handsome by the dashing interludes of the variations. The soloist's tone was superb and his handling of the extremely difficult work was true virtuosity.

The concert opened with the familiar "Leonore Overture No. 3" of Beethoven, an almost literal rendering of the opera's story, and closed with Ravel's scintillating

Party of 7 Rescued After 20 Hours on Raft

ASTORIA, Ore. (UP)—Three children and four adults, cast adrift when their fishing boat sank, were rescued from an island in the Columbia river Sunday after they had floated almost 20 hours on a makeshift raft in freezing weather.

They are Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Hall, Warrenton, and their three children, Nixon, 6, Susan, 6, and Alla, 4, and Mr. and Mrs. Chub Folberg.

Picked up by a maritime commission patrol boat, they were taken to a hospital and treated for exposure and shock.

Their 38-foot boat sank in 6 feet of water Saturday afternoon when it struck bottom.

The party clung to the stern section until the men could lash lumber together to make a raft. Early Sunday they paddled to a small island, where the patrol boat spotted them.
