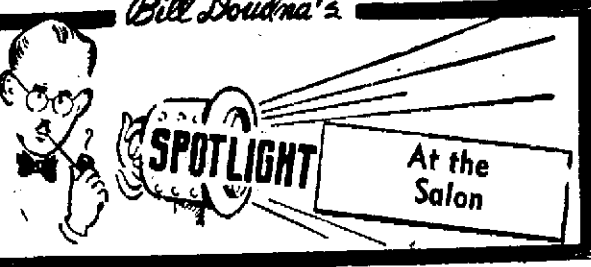

Air Force Sets New Enlistment Standards

New regulations concerning the enlistment or reenlistment in the air force by men with dependents were announced Wednesday by Technical Sgt. William E. Burtis, detachment commander of the Madison army and air force recruiting station.
Effective immediately, men who have previous service in any of the armed forces and who have dependents may be enlisted in the air force if they are eligible for enlistment in grade E-4 (sergeant) or higher.
Men without previous service may be enlisted in grades E-1 (private), E-2 (Pfc.), or E-3 (corporal) if they have no more than two dependents.
Airmen now serving, including reservists on extended active duty, may reenlist immediately without regard to number of dependents.

City Firm's Packing Box Wins Industrial Prize

A packaging crate developed by the Ohio Chemical and Surgical Equipment Co. recently won a blue ribbon in the Industrial Packaging and Materials Handling Engineers' Assn. competition in Philadelphia.
The crate, made to accommodate a washer and sterilizer unit, utilizes one end of the box as a base during assembly. The other end is bolted to the top of the sterilizer by one bolt. Then the body of the box is wrapped around the equipment and fastened shut.
The new box reduces crating time from an hour and one-half to 20 minutes, and at the same time conserves crating material.

TELEVISION: The Protestant Radio Commission (PRC) will seek the allotment of at least one television channel in each community for educational or religious institutions. Dr. Ronald Bridges revealed in an address before the United Council of Church Women at Cincinnati. Dr. Bridges said that the commission has filed a petition with the Federal Communications commission, which will start TV allocation hearings Nov. 27.

Dr. Bridges emphasized that the PRC is not seeking the allotment for itself nor the churches it represents "but for all the people, whatever their creed or need, in every American community." He explained that although the commission is the only petitioner seeking a special TV allocation for non-profit institutions, "several educational bodies will join the PRC in support of the request."

He likened the current request for TV channels to "another stampede into Indian territory." "In that historic scramble for Cherokee lands," Dr. Bridges declared, "there were mighty few people in the front ranks with an eye on claims for schools and churches, and in the 1950 rush for video claims there seems to be a scarcity of pioneers ready to serve this highest public interest of education and religion."

COMMENDATION: "Breakthrough," the movie about the Normandy beachhead landing which opens Dec. 6 at the Capitol theater, has been commended by the U. S. army as a great tribute to the American foot-soldier.

Maj. Gen. Floyd L. Parks, chief of the department of the department of the army, said of the film: "David Brian, John Agar and the rest of the carefully selected cast succeeded in conveying to the audience the heartbreaks, the hazards, and the handicaps that the infantryman experiences in fighting a hard battle against a hardened enemy. Their portrayal was true to life and the whole picture is a commentary on the heroic and difficult part played by the foot soldiers in modern combat."

Brig. Gen. Eugene L. Harrison, deputy chief of information, said that "every man who wore the

crossed rifles of the infantry will recognize in the members of the third platoon (in "Breakthrough") a composite of his rugged weary footsore comrades in the battle of fortress Europe, in the steaming jungles and the bloody coral islands of the South Pacific, and the rugged hills of Korea."
