North Carolina Man Called 'Practical'

RALEIGH, N. C., Nov. 25 (AP)—Willis Smith describes himself as conservative but insists, "I'm not quite as reactionary as some have suggested."

Smith won the Democratic senate nomination on a platform of opposition to some of President Truman's pet "Fair Deal" proposals, including the Brannan farm plan, government medical aid and FEPC. He defeated Sen. Frank Graham, a friend and supporter of the President.

In an interview, Smith said he favors an "equitable excess-profits tax if one can be devised" but that he would have to study further the questions of all-out rearmament and continued foreign-aid spending.

The Marshall Plan, he added, has "accomplished a great deal, but I doubt if we can take care of all the wants of the world."

Smith, a strapping six-footer of 63 who looks much younger, said he regards Republican election victories to some extent as "a trend away from so-called radical views and tendencies."

A former president of the American Bar Association, Smith is leaving one of the most lucrative law practices in North Carolina, a practice built since he graduated from Trinity College (now Duke University) law school in 1912.

He worked to pay much of his college expenses but found time to play varsity basketball and become top man in his class. He served three terms in the North Carolina legislature, one as Speaker of the House.

A close associate describes Smith as "essentially a practical man" and tells of a conference Smith once had with Sen. Graham, who then was president of the University of North Carolina.

Graham then was sponsoring the "Graham Plan" to de-emphasize football in the Southern Conference.

Said Smith: "Dr. Graham, I can give you a formula to de-emphasize football overnight."

"What is that, Willis?" asked Graham. "Reduce the admission price for football games to 50 cents."

SPRINGFIELD, Ohio, Nov. 25. (AP) The Luther League of America today launched a campaign to increase its membership from 30,000 to 50,000 in 1951.

The plan was explained to Luther League presidents from more than a score of states and Canada at a meeting at Wittenberg College here. The league is the youth organization of the United Lutheran Church in America.

Leslie Conrad Jr., league executive secretary, said Lutheran youths 18 to 24 will be asked to volunteer for the caravans. They will be trained at conference centers set up in the south, east and midwest.

TUCSON, Ariz., Nov. 25. (AP) A large-scale search for a light plane missing between here and Blythe, Calif., was called off today when the pilot reported he and two passengers were unhurt after a crash landing south of the Mexican border.

Pilot Homer Milner of Lancaster, Calif., said his plane was forced down near Costa Rica in the Mexican state of Sonora. He was flying Sidney Sebastian and Jack Klingler, both employees of United Aircraft at Murco, Calif., to Port Worth, Texas.

Senator Doubts O. K. This Year on Profits Levy

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25. (AP) Sen. Cain (R.-Wash.) predicted today the Senate will not pass an excess profits tax this year. "It seems that the administration is insisting upon enactment of one type of tax bill that is highly controversial — excess profits," Cain told a reporter.

"It will be passed by the House but not by the Senate this session." The nation's situation demands sacrifices in the way of higher taxes on individuals and businesses for some years, Cain said, but added:

"Congress should be very careful about the type of tax it enacts so as not to put out of business those businesses that would pay the taxes."

Cain said he believed that about all that would be brought up in the session starting Monday would be the excess profits tax proposal, bills to grant statehood to Alaska and Hawaii, consideration of extension of rent control and possibly a deficiency appropriations bill.

A top-ranking Republican has thrown his weight into the administration drive to pass an excess profits tax bill in the lame duck session of Congress.

Sen. Millikin (R.-Colo.) told reporters yesterday he will keep his pre-election pledge to try for passage of such a measure. He added, however, that time elements are working against final action in both Houses.

Millikin is a member of the Senate finance committee and chairman of the conference of Republican Senators.

He said he will make "a good faith effort" to get a law passed that would collect taxes "on the profits from the Korean war and go back as far as the facts show are necessary."

Vets Warned to Read Fine Print on Deals

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25. (AP) The Veterans Administration cautioned veterans today to "read the fine print" before making down payments on homes.

The agency said it has received complaints from veterans, many of whom discover that documents they thought were sale contracts turned out to be only "reservations to purchase."

Other complaints have to do with escalator and other clauses in sales agreements. "In most cases the difficulty arose from the veterans' failure to read and understand the sale contracts and other papers which they signed," VA said.

"Actually, there is little VA can do once a veteran has entered into an agreement with a seller. A contract or sales agreement is a private matter over which VA has no control."

Scientists Measure, Find 'Shape' of Atomic Nucleus

CHICAGO, Nov. 25. (AP) A new research tool has measured the nucleus of an atom of gold. University of Illinois scientists reported today.

A research team disclosed at a meeting of the American Physical Society that the nucleus' diameter is three-tenths of a trillionth of an inch.

This means that three and one-third trillion of the nuclei placed in a row would span one inch.

The physicists said their data tended to support the theory that positively charged protons and uncharged neutrons are mixed to form a bell-shaped nucleus of the atom.

The scientists entered the core of the atom with a beam of high energy electrons emerging from a high voltage betatron. They will continue their nuclear experiments with a new 300,000-volt betatron, the world's largest.

India in Danger of Red Invasion, Knowland Warns

MANILA, Nov. 25. (AP) Sen. Knowland (R.-Calif.) today criticized India for failing to send troops to Korea and for not taking a firmer stand against the Chinese Red invasion of Tibet.

Knowland warned, at a news conference, that India itself was in danger of invasion. He said: "Some of those nations which did not help (in the Korean fighting) may find themselves victims of aggression."

"I have particular reference to India. I have a great deal of sympathy for the problems of India. But, I think you are not going to stop militant Communism with passive resistance."

"It seems any nation situated like India, where she may be the victim of aggression, should be prepared to help turn back the Communists."

Sen. and Mrs. Knowland plan to leave here Tuesday on a Pan American plane for Honolulu and San Francisco, arriving at the latter city Thursday.

U. S. Sets Fund of 300 Millions for French Aid

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25. (AP) Diplomatic authorities said yesterday that the U. S. has marked between \$300,000,000 and \$400,000,000 for a two-year program of aid to French and native forces fighting Communist-supported rebels in Indochina.

The French National Assembly approved yesterday a plan for creation of a Vietnam national army in Indochina to be commanded by former Emperor Bao Dai. The U. S. has been urging France to give Vietnam and its associated states a greater measure of independence.

Indignant Hepburn Backs Into Stove

BLACKWELL, Okla., Nov. 25. (AP) Actress Katherine Hepburn, who tangled with the law in a real-life courtroom drama, had a ruffled temper and a scorched \$5500 mink coat as results.

Her chauffeur, Charles Newhill, received a ticket from a highway patrolman while rushing Miss Hepburn to Wichita, Kan., for a performance of "As You Like It" last night.

Patrolman Wayne Young told Acting Peace Justice Roy Cox that the fiery Miss Hepburn's Lincoln automobile was going 80 miles an hour when he made the pinch.

The actress, remembering the courtroom scenes in the movie, "Adam's Rib," in which she played an attorney, tried the gentle approach. She told Cox she was responsible for Newhill's conduct and that just hadn't realized he was violating the 65 m. p. h. speed limit.

"We would have been glad to slow down," she said, "if you (pointing a finger at Young) had just warned us." The trooper just smiled. The judge remained unconvinced.

Miss Hepburn tossed her red hair and glared at Young. "You don't have sense enough to be an officer," she snapped.

Then she backed into the courtroom stove. The long mink coat she was wearing scorched.

Cox fined Newhill \$10 and said he was sorry Miss Hepburn had burned her coat. "It probably didn't hurt that \$1000 coat too much," he commented.

The actress, turning to leave, was indignant. "One thousand? This coat cost \$5500," she snarled and stalked out of the room.

Man Leaves Monastery, Reunited With Wife in L. A.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 25. (AP) Donald D. Foster, middle-aged San Francisco businessman who renounced worldly affairs to enter a Benedictine monastery, was reunited with his wife today and disclosed he has left the monastery "for the time being."

Foster gave up his \$54,000 yearly business last January to enter St. John's Abbey at Collegeville, Minn. His wife stayed behind to wind up their affairs, but said she also hoped to enter a religious order.

Foster refused to say today whether he had given up his idea of entering the priesthood. He answered questions by exhibiting a statement which said: "Because of difficulties involved in fulfilling the conditions specified for obtaining a dispensation (for a married man to enter priesthood), Mr. Foster thought it advisable to return to San Francisco until such time as the requirements can be met."

At the time Foster left San Francisco to enter the abbey he said the dispensation would be granted if Mrs. Foster entered a convent.

Foster and his wife were registered at a hotel here today. He said he will remain here another week and then will return to San Francisco.

Damaged Cargo Ships at Anchor After Lake Crash

MACKINAW CITY, Mich., Nov. 25. (AP) Two crippled freighters stood at anchor in this wintry harbor today pending an investigation of their collision in a near-zero snowstorm.

The Elton Hoyt rammed into the ore-laden Endog M. Voorhees just off St. Helena Island west of the Straits of Mackinac yesterday.

The collision damaged the Hoyt's bow and tore a hole in the port side of the Voorhees about midships. However, none of the crew of either ship was seriously hurt. Both vessels limped under their own power to the harbor here and then on to McGulpin Point and there on to the harbor here.

Tito's One-time Tough Rival Free

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, Nov. 25. (AP) A man the Russians once apparently regarded as strong enough to unseat Premier Marshal Tito has been released from prison after confession to a plot against the government.

Freed after more than two years imprisonment was Mladen Zujovic, one-time close collaborator of Marshal Tito and a member of the Yugoslav Communist party's central committee before the Soviet-led Cominform broke with Tito in 1948.

Zujovic, an old-line Communist of 25 years' party membership, formerly commanded a strong following in Yugoslavia. His release by Marshal Tito caused a sensation here.

The action indicated that Tito had broken down one of his toughest opponents. Zujovic's belated confession emphasized that Tito's Communist party's outlook to the Soviet bloc of Communist nations "gave me and millions of others from a dreadful nightmare and put us on the path of truth."

The former finance minister admitted having plotted with Anatole I. Lavrentiev, then Russian ambassador in Belgrade, and having spied for the Soviet Union.

Wife Seeks Permit to See Prisoner

TAIPEI, Formosa, Nov. 25. (AP) An American woman today appealed to the Chinese Communists to permit her to visit her husband, a prisoner of the Reds for 10 months.

Mrs. Robert Buol in a radio-gram to Chinese Premier Chou En-lai, respectfully requested a safe conduct into and out of Kuming, capital of Yunnan Province. Her husband was taken there after his arrest.

Buol, formerly of Stockton, Calif., was seized by the Reds Jan. 15 when they occupied the southwest Chinese tin mining center of Mengtze. He was serving as chief of operations of retired Maj. Gen. Claire L. Chennault's civil air transport line and arrived at Mengtze the day of its capture.

Mrs. Buol appealed to Chou in August to free her husband, but received no reply.

California Seaman Stabbed in Manila

MANILA, Nov. 25. (AP) An American crew member of the President Lines' ship President Cleveland was stabbed today as he left a Manila bar.

Police said that the crewman, Burgess H. Watkins, 26, of Berkeley, Calif., was jumped and stabbed seven times with a ballpoint knife, a long dagger, by an unidentified assailant.

Driver Finds Dry Era Scotch

ALEXANDRIA BAY, N. Y., Nov. 25. (AP) A bus on the St. Lawrence River today marked a cache of 200 dry bottles of Scotch whisky and sauterne wine apparently dumped by a rum-runner of the prohibition era.

Donald H. Gray of Clayton discovered the liquor while diving for a wrecked speedboat. He said the wreckage had landed among the bottles in about 50 feet of water.

Gray said yesterday he had laid claim to the liquor and had asked the Jefferson County Alcoholic Beverage Control Board how he could obtain legal title.

The St. Lawrence River forms the boundary between Canada and the United States in this area. Rum-runners of the prohibition era (1920-1933) dumped their Canadian cargoes frequently when federal men were pursuing them.
