Uta Hagen

TIP O' THE MORNING: Concert-goers will have a brief preview of Baritone Mack Harrell Sunday. He'll be in Ravel's "L'Heure Espagnole" when the N. Y. Philharmonic-Symphony does a concert version on CBS-WBBM at noon.

Uta Hagen, daughter of Prof. Oskar F. L. Hagen of the University of Wisconsin, is "one of our best younger actresses," according to the Billboard, weekly theatrical newspaper. Bob Francis so described her in a review of "The Country Girl," in which she costars with Paul Kelly.

Miss Hagen, Francis wrote, gives a picture of a girl who is "a strange combination of quiet strength, contempt, affection, and angry bitterness—all coupled with an unswerving loyalty."

Miss Hagen, Kelly, and Steven Hill "combine to project some of the best acting of the season," Francis added.

ON THE AIR: Ten national leaders in the field of communication are scheduled to speak on "The Cooper Union Forum" beginning Sunday at 3 p. m. over WMAQ. Among the speakers will be Joseph Barnes, former editor of the New York Herald Tribune; Seymour N. Siegel, director of radio communications for the city of New York; Charles A. Steppan, author; Alistair Cooke, British foreign correspondent; S. I. Hayakawa, author and editor, and Paul F. Lazarfeld, professor of sociology at Columbia University.

The forum topic is "Ideas and Their Communication," with individual broadcasts based on education, the press, art, the right to find out, language in thought and action, mass persuasion, mass media, and peoples speaking to peoples.

CHORUS MEMBER: Rachel Barnes, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Barnes, R-3, is a member of the 200-voice Carthage college chorus, which sang recently in the Illinois school's production of "Elijah." Miss Barnes is a freshman.

REVERES' ANGLES: "You are a shiftless tramp and you will end in the gutter," shouted Edmund Gwenn's father when the 17-year-old youth said he wanted to be an actor. His first professional appearance was in the play, "Rogues and Vagabonds." His limousine has a uniformed chauffeur. The late George Bernard Shaw personally selected him for a role in "Man and Superman," as a chauffeur. Enraged, he enlisted in the Royal Army Service Corps at the outbreak of World War I, not expecting to find any theatre people in the Army with him. He was Ronald Colman, Nigel Bruce, Ian Hunter and Basil Rathbone. He has no children. In "For Heaven's Sake," his latest picture, he tries to persuade Joan Bennett and Robert Cummings to have a baby.

Most stars consider two or three films a year enough work for anyone. During the first eight months of 1950 he has been in four. American audiences hail him as a discovery in "The Bishop Misbehaves," the first picture he saw him in. He had important roles in 21 English films before he was seen here. He is thought of as a quiet, plodding little man. He was once a dance instructor, specializing in tango.

An actor's private life is his own concern, he believes, and his only obligation is to give a good performance. He recently arose from his sick bed to appear before a convention and tell about his childhood. He loves cats, and has three as pets. In almost every movie he has scenes with dogs, including the Lassie pictures and "Mister 880." Since he won the Academy Award for portraying Santa Claus in "Miracle on 34th Street" he has been looking for another human interest part. He says he has found it in "Mister 880" where he plays a counterfeiter. He believes it should be against the law for anyone to possess weapons of any sort. He is an expert fencer, and used to give lessons in swordplay. Though born in London, he has no desire to visit Europe. He enjoys speaking and reading German and French. When he gets old he expects to retire. Last September 25th he celebrated his 73rd birthday. In London, in 1919, he gave a helping hand to a struggling young actor. In 1942 he appeared in "Random Harvest" with the same actor, Ronald Colman. He suffered from influenza while making "For Heaven's Sake" with Clifton Webb, Joan Bennett and Robert Cummings. When the picture finished he found he had gained eight pounds. He has played 88 different roles on the screen. When asked how he likes his latest part he always replies, in all sincerity: "It's the best I've ever had!"

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State Evangelical United Brethren Churches Assigned

Evangelical United Brethren churches in Wisconsin and Illinois have been assigned to the Northwest Episcopal area and will be under the supervision of Bishop E. W. Frazer, St. Paul, four Madison residents who attended the 10-day session of the church's general conference recently reported.

Attending the sessions were Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Witte and the Rev. and Mrs. William G. F. Hayes. The general conference was held at Dayton, O.

Other actions taken at the conference, the Madison delegates reported were:

ONE. Reduction of the number of bishops from nine to seven.

TWO. Approval of a special "merger" meeting of two former Wisconsin divisions of the church—the Wisconsin Evangelical conference and the Wisconsin United Brethren conference.

The meeting will be held at Monroe in May, 1951. Merger of the two groups will bring Evangelical United Brethren membership in the state to 25,000.

THREE. Elected Mr. Hayes, now superintendent of the church in this area, as member and secretary of the board of trustees of the Evangelical Children's home, Flat Rock, O.

The next session of the general conference will be held in November, 1954.

Stepped-Up Chicken Production Urged

Wisconsin produced approximately 5,000,000 broiler chickens last year, but J. B. Hayes, poultry specialist at the University of Wisconsin, feels that broiler production could be stepped up in the state.

Every week a carload—30,000 pounds—of dressed broilers comes from outside the state to the Milwaukee market, Hayes said. Wisconsin farmers could satisfy this market, he contended.

One farmer could produce 250,000 pounds of poultry in a year, he estimated.

It takes about 3 pounds of feed to make one pound of meat. Some modern broiler plants produce 36,000 birds per man.
