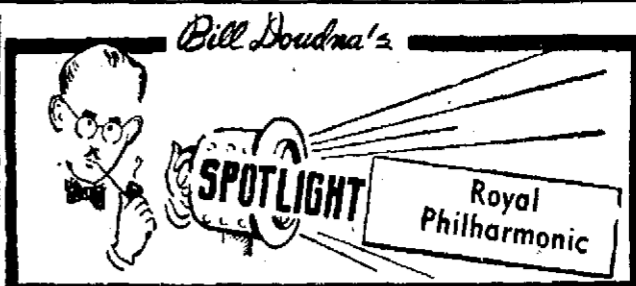

Dignity, good taste, sprightly humor, impeccable musicianship—all these marked the concert which the Royal Philharmonic orchestra under Sir Thomas Beecham gave Monday night in the University of Wisconsin stock pavilion.

All the 3,100 seats were filled, and so great had been the demand for tickets that a much larger auditorium was needed.

The audience was receptive, almost eager. If it had been that way before Sir Thomas appeared, it would have been so within a few moments after the concert began.

He is the kind of conductor who can win his listeners with his personality and inject that personality into the program to the advantage of the music.

Soloists of superlative worth added to the concert's brilliance. They were Dennis Brain, in one of Mozart's four concertos for horn and orchestra; Concertmaster David McCallum, in Delius' "Dance Rhapsody No. 1," and Leonard Brain, brother of Dennis, who played bass oboe in the Delius work.

The audience called Sir Thomas back to the podium for bow after bow and, at last, an encore—Mozart march.

He trod a red carpet, but the good humor and the friendliness of his approach to music, musicians, and audience belied the suggestion of pomp which such a carpet always brings.

Three of the four programmed works were touched with their composers' sense of humor. There were the stammering of the first violins in Haydn's "Symphony No. 102," breathless hurrying in the Mozart concerto, and a jolly caricature of the town pipers (one of whom knew only three notes) in the third movement of

giving the impression of one long, unending phrase—was beautiful. Dennis Brain's playing in the Mozart concerto called for superlative piled upon superlative. Most of all, one noticed the clean intonation and the clear phrasing, both necessities for adequate projection of Mozart.

The orchestra plans to return to the United States two years hence, to perform on the West coast, an area skipped on this tour.

One can hope that Sir Thomas and the men and women of whom he seemed so proud will include Madison on that trip.
