Durante Insists on Same Show NEW YORK. (AP) Jimmy Durante's skyrocketing success in television after only two shows is attributed largely to his insistence on being the same Durante he has been in other angles of show business. As the story goes, the production staff had a format all laid out that would adapt Durante to TV rather than vice versa. It didn't take him long to get things going his way, for "nobody's goin' to get me into that act even if everybody wants to get into mine." Since the Hit Parade has gone into television it has found the huge stage of the 3000-seat center theater in Rockefeller Center, which NBC recently revamped for camera purposes, too small for all of its activities. It has been on moving out into the spacious and elaborately carpeted lobby and the foyer stairways to put on some of the numbers. For the off-stage presentations as many as four extra cameras are required. Altogether a half-dozen or more, counting those on stage, often are employed. The numbers so displayed are singing and dancing acts in which petite Dorothy Collins is generally an important factor. The nation's video broadcasters are gathering in New York for the sixth annual one-day clinic of the Television Broadcasters Association. They plan to discuss a lot of things visual, including color, with Comedian Ed Wynn back for a return engagement as speaker, this time at the lunch-

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Radio 'Hams' Ready for Service in Civilian Defense

By C. E. BUTTERFIELD NEW YORK. (AP) The nation's 80,000 amateur radio station operators, many already experienced in emergency communications in floods and other instances, are getting set to aid in civilian defense.

The "hams" plan to do this through a supporting communications system for use in event of enemy attack, such as an atom bomb.

The amateurs are co-operating with the National Security Resources Board which has included their service in its defense communications layout. The amateurs would use two-way short-wave radio installations in automobiles or portable pack sets (walkie-talkie type), all self-powered.

Recent hypothetical atom bomb drop tests conducted in Seattle and Chicago indicated the extent to which amateur facilities were prepared to furnish emergency circuits. In Chicago 300 amateur mobile radio units were available. The Seattle trials also had a large amateur group.

Explaining how the system used in the tests came about, the American Radio Relay League, national association of the amateurs, gives this outline: "The preparedness did not just happen. For many years under guidance of A. R. L. L. amateurs have operated an emergency communications service, the A. R. L. L. Emergency Corps. In each of the league's regional areas, usually state-size, a section emergency co-ordinator has charge. Local emergency co-ordinators keep contact with Red Cross, Civil Defense and other municipal agencies.

"Each year in June the emergency corps participates in a field day, operating portable equipment under simulated disaster conditions for a 24-hour stretch. Annually in October, the league sponsors jointly with the Red Cross simulated emergency tests on a surprise basis.

"The emergency corps is always alert and ready to serve in emergencies and disasters, whether it be supplying communications for search parties looking for a lost child, or furnishing scores of mobile and portable radio stations as the only means of communication with the outside world in such incidents as the Texas City explosion.

When the last two world wars started, amateur stations were closed down to make their air space available for the heavy military use. However, six months after Pearl Harbor in World War II, a stop-gap civilian defense war emergency radio service was set up, organized and manned primarily by amateurs.

Now the planning is that in event of war, segments of the amateur channels would be retained for use by amateurs in supplying civil defense communication facilities.
