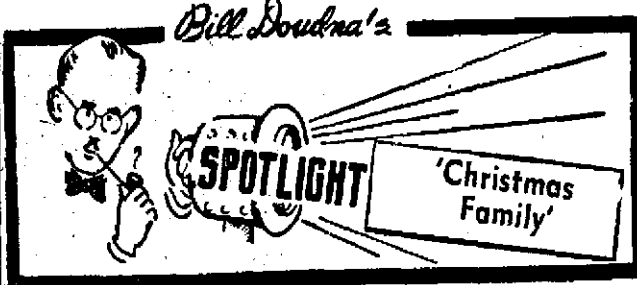

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Burglary Suspects to Be Tried in Circuit Court

The three Madison men accused of burglarizing the Shamrock bar, 117 W. Main st., of \$1,900 will face trial in circuit court, it was ordered Wednesday by Superior Judge Roy H. Proctor.

The burglary was committed Dec. 6. After a two-day preliminary hearing, the court ruled that Ralph J. Flick, 31, of 4 S. Lake st.; Robert N. Menter, 31, of 1713 Monroe st., and Edward J. Kujawa, 55, of 1327 Williamson st., must face trial in circuit court. The men are charged with breaking and entering and larceny.

Judge Proctor denied a request that Flick's trial be held in superior court without a jury.

Red Cross Home Nursing Courses to Start Jan. 8-9

Registration is now open for Red Cross home nursing courses scheduled to begin Jan. 8 and 9. Mrs. Maud Jensen, director of Red Cross nursing services, announced Wednesday night.

Another afternoon course will meet on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons for a three-week period. Both courses will be held at Red Cross headquarters, 302 E. Washington Ave.

To register, women may call 5-0021 between 8 a. m. and 4:30 p. m. from now until Jan. 8.

An evening course in home nursing will be sponsored at the Vocational school, beginning Jan. 9. Classes will meet on Tuesday and Friday from 7 to 9 p. m. for three weeks. Women may register for this course by signing up at the Vocational school on Monday, Jan. 8.

Beggs Tells Need for Polio Funds

Polio epidemics, striking the nation three years in succession, have cost the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis more than \$8,000,000 for patient-care alone and have left the organization with a bare treasury to face epidemic aid demands of next year, it was disclosed Wednesday night by Loyal T. Beggs, Dane county campaign director of the 1951 March of Dimes.

Since the organization was created in 1938, it has provided \$94,000,000 for patient-care, Beggs declared. Almost two-thirds of this amount, he said, was spent in 1948, 1949, and 1950, when more than 100,000 persons in the United States and its territories were stricken.

Approximately 54,000 men, women, and children afflicted by polio needed some March of Dimes help during 1950, the director asserted, 30,000 of them patients from previous years.
