Buildings, New Facilities of L. B. Schools Inspected

SCHOOLS still are closed for the Christmas-New Year holidays today but seven of them were opened yesterday as members of the Board of Education and Douglas A. Newcomb, superintendent of schools, inspected construction and new facilities.

Inspected schools were Stevenson, Lincoln, Burbank, Lee, Bryant, Wilson and Naples. Upon conclusion of the tour, the board conducted its weekly meeting, delayed one day for the observance of Christmas.

Business Mgr. A. A. Knoll recommended that a fence be constructed on the west side of Lindbergh Junior High School, Market St. and Lewis Ave., and the board approved.

A letter from the North Long Beach Club, advocating the drawing of standard "master plans" for school construction, was read. The letter suggested that the plans be filed with the State Division of Architecture with each plan being designated by a number.

Architect's fees, including supervision of construction, are 8 per cent of the estimated construction cost. That percentage was paid here and by other school districts throughout the nation.

Recently, the Long Beach district estimates an estimated \$60,000 savings when architects agreed to accept a payment of 5 per cent to revise used plans and adapt them for construction of four new elementary schools.
