Blackwood on Bridge

Against a no trump contract, Mr. Abel's lead of the deuce of spades (his partner's bid suit) would have been eminently correct. At a suit bid, however, declarer could be expected to stop the run of the spade suit with his own or dummy's trumps. East-West vulnerable. North (Mrs. Keen) ... South (Miss Brash) ... The bidding: East 1 S, South 2 H, West 3 H, North 4 H. Holding as many as four spades and a very weak hand, Mr. Abel might well have chosen to open the queen of diamonds. Surely he was on lead for the last time, and he might be lucky enough to find the king of diamonds on the board and the ace in his partner's hand. If not at least he would have shown where his pitiful bit of strength lay—and that might have clarified the defense of the hand for Mr. Champion. But the opening was the deuce of spades and Mr. Champion won with the queen. Now the great man was on a spot for his next play. The opening lead made it seem probable that Mr. Abel had four spades and Miss Brash only one. If that were the case, then another spade lead would give declarer time to pick up the trumps and establish her probable secondary suit. But what was her secondary suit—clubs or diamonds? Mr. Champion figured the hand could probably be set if Mr. Abel had the queen of clubs, not over four long—or as much as queen 10 in the diamond suit. He finally decided to try to "find" Mr. Abel in the suit where he needed to hold just one honor card. So he led the ace and another club. Curtains! Miss Brash won the second club, took out trumps and threw one of dummy's diamonds on her fourth club. Thus her contract was easily made. "I believe," said Mr. Abel timidly, "that we could have set them if you had switched to diamonds." "How could I tell that," yelled Mr. Champion. "If you had opened your queen of diamonds, she wouldn't have had a chance." "I led the fourth best of the suit you bid," protested Mr. Abel. "Against no trump, fine," said Mr. Champion. "But against a suit bid, how many spades did you think we could run—with you holding four of them? The more of your partner's suit you have the more you look for a better lead."

U.S. Military Activity Brings Prosperity to French Port City

BORDEAUX, France—(U.P.)—The establishment of American military bases here to open an emergency supply line to Germany through France has brought a prosperity boom to this region. The area was ravaged last year by the worst forest fires in its history. Some 3,000 U. S. soldiers and civilian experts poured into Bordeaux after France had agreed to turn over harbor and warehousing facilities to America. Hundreds of new jobs were created for the local population. Before the agreement was signed, the dockers in the Bordeaux and La Pallice harbors could not find enough work and were fertile territory for Communist agitators. The devastated surrounding forests were an eyesore of thousands of scorched acres. Material Pours In Since the first American Liberty ships arrived here, 20,000 tons of material, mainly bombs, have been unloaded and transhipped at the rate of 10 trains a day. An additional 40,000 tons are scheduled to arrive in the next three months. Dockers are busy and Communist demonstrations fell flat when it became known that the Americans were paying wages well above union scale. In the forests, army bulldozers and trucks have cleared campsites where white-peaked tents sprang up almost overnight, and more French workers found employment. It was reported an airport would be built, which eventually would become French property with the rest of the American improvements by terms of the agreement. At first, the arrival of the American troops was viewed with concern by the population, which well remembered the heavy Allied bombardments of German centers here in 1942-44 and feared the same thing would happen if Russia invaded France. The thoroughness with which the new installations were set up convinced citizens that the Americans "are here to stay" and the stimulant to employment and business was felt throughout the region. French technicians and laborers have nearly completed the construction of wood and cement barracks, roads, depots, car sheds and administration buildings. Meanwhile, the troops are lodged in tents and French barracks in the vicinity.

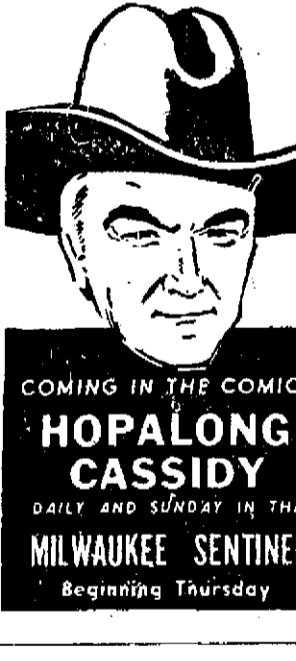
