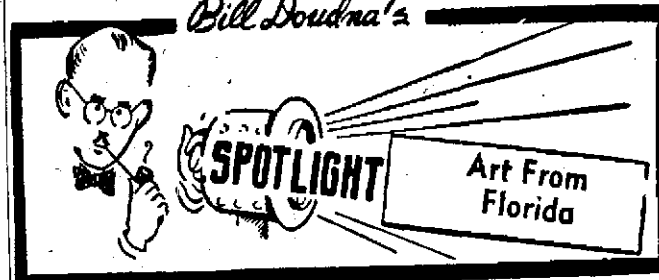

Twenty-eight paintings by the Florida Artist Group, chosen from 69 shown in its first annual exhibition last April at the University of Florida, will go on display today in the Memorial Union's main gallery. The show will be sponsored by the Wisconsin Union gallery committee, of which Charles Quinn, Madison, is chairman.

Robert Parsons, vice-president and director of the Associated American Artists gallery in New York City, was the April exhibition's juror; he selected the 28 paintings now on tour.

"The Parsons selections," said an announcement from the Union, "truly representative of the contemporary art of Florida, are presented as evidence of the progressive spirit in Florida art."

"The Florida Artist Group was established as an educational, non-profit corporation in 1949. Its purpose is 'to stimulate the development of high standards of creative art in the state of Florida.'"

"After World War II, widely known artists of Florida and leaders in the field of art education recognized that much could be done to arouse the interest of the Florida public in good art. They felt that progress along these lines could be attained through an organized group of artists who had gained recognition for their work in the interpretation of Florida subject matter. The exhibition now at the Union shows the first fruits of their work."

"Since the first showing, the exhibition has been presented at the University of Miami; the Norton Gallery and School of Art, Palm Beach; Shepherd college, Shepherdstown, W. Va.; Allegheny college, Meadville, Pa.; and Rochester Memorial Art Gallery, Rochester, N. Y."
