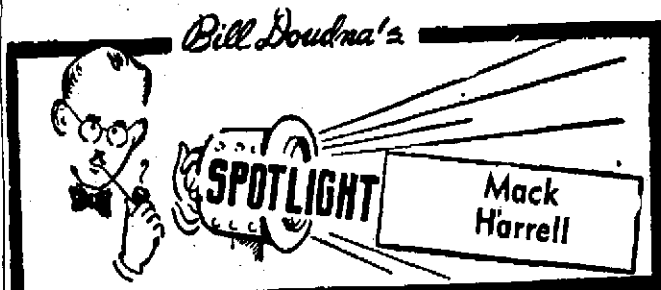

TIP O' THE MORNING: "The March of Dimes," dedicated to the Warm Springs foundation's annual appeal, will be performed for the first time by the Band of America over NBC-WIBA at 8:30 p. m. Monday.

The sort of singer whose voice and personality grow on you gradually and continue to grow even after the concert, but whose musical honesty is immediately apparent—such a singer is Mack Harrell, the baritone who gave the first of two Madison concerts Thursday night in the Wisconsin Union theater.

Harrell will offer a totally different program there at 8 tonight—different in content, but equally well planned and tastefully chosen. First impression of the artist Thursday night was of his utter sincerity; second was of the quality of his voice. Ironic in the upper register and forceful in the lowest; third was of his interpretation, his feeling for the music, his ability to express that feeling.

Most of his songs were unfamiliar, but they served to exhibit all the facets of his talent, whether in the incredible sadness of Hahn's "Unfaithfulness" or the rollicking fun of "Jabberwocky," written by his skillful accompanist, Paul Berl.

The audience liked best—to judge by applause—Harrell's convincing performance of a group of Brahms songs, perhaps the best he has done. The fun-making of Charles Ives' "Memories" and of the fabulous song of the Munchausenque "Crocodile."

Nevertheless, his works which many of his listeners will remember longest were those by modern Frenchmen—Duparc, Debussy, Poulenc, Hahn, and Faure. To them, he gave infinite care, exquisite shading.

For encores, there were "This Little Rose," by William Roy; "Gentle Annie," by Stephen Foster; and "The Crocodile," an old English song.

Tonight, Harrell will sing early and modern American songs, a group of lieder, three French numbers, and Carl Loewe's "Archibald Douglas."
