Twelve persons died in Wisconsin traffic accidents in the first 15 days of 1951, the safety division of the state motor vehicle department reported Tuesday. During the same period last year, 28 were killed.

Prof. Haugen Translates Old Icelandic Manuscript

An edition, translation, and commentary by a University of Wisconsin professor on a 12th century Icelandic manuscript has been published by the Linguistic Society of America.

Prof. Einar Haugen, chairman of the department of Scandinavian studies, is the author of the monograph, "The First Grammatical Treatise."

The monograph includes the full text of the proposal by an anonymous Icelandic scholar for reformed spelling of his native language, the first English translation of the treatise, and an analysis of the contents and its relation to the general current of medieval grammatical study.

Prof. Haugen says that this essay is marked by one of the most remarkable insights into the structure of language found in any medieval author.

400,000 Valuation on Gay Building Called Excessive

Protested assessments on the Gay building, Madison's first skyscraper, and four other properties represented by Atty. William J. P. Ward, were heard Tuesday by the city board of review.

Valuation of the 35-year old office building at 16 N. Carroll st., completed in 1915, was increased in 1950 from \$266,550 to \$400,500.

David G. Gay, who now owns the controlling interest in the property, testified that its original cost was \$160,803 at "cut-rate" building figures and declared he would sell it for \$20,000.

It operated "in the red" until the last three years, and never paid a dividend to stockholders, he said.

Harold C. Balch, architect and engineer, held the present market value of the building is only \$178,000, based on a reproduction cost of \$402,500, less depreciation, while Assessor Leonard B. Krueger claimed its replacement would cost at least \$640,000.

Dr. R. E. Campbell, 4143 Manitowish way, \$21,700 to \$37,950.

10 Employees Picket Nash-Madison, Inc., in Contract Dispute

Ten employees of Nash-Madison, Inc., 2201 University ave., were picketing the firm Tuesday afternoon after walking off their jobs earlier in the day.

The workers, all members of Local 433, CIO United Auto Workers (UAW) went on strike because of unsuccessful contract negotiations with management, according to Charles Duane, chairman of the groups bargaining committee.

The 10 employees, all workers in the firm's service department, make up about half the service department employees. The others, non-members of the union, remained on their jobs Tuesday and were expected back today.

Duane said that the workers and management failed to reach agreement on wages, insurance, vacations, and other demands made by the workers.

He said that they had not asked for across the board wage increases because the jobs of the 10 union members varied.

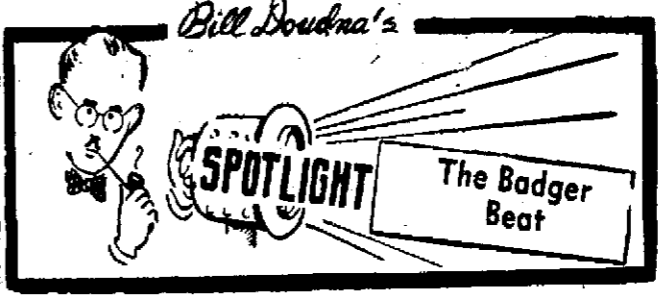
Hervy E. Ray and Don C. Cornelius, co-partners in the firm, said that "Nash-Madison pays union wages all along the line except in cases where some employees have received merit raises above scale."

"Our offer to the men is as good as any they'll find in Madison," Ray said, "and the door remains open for negotiations any time the men want negotiations reopened."

Cornelius said that in spite of picket lines, cars came in and out of the garage as usual Tuesday afternoon.

"With 10 men off the job we couldn't accomplish as much work as usual," he said, "but all departments were operating and will continue to do so."

Duane said that many of the demands of the union are in effect at the firm now, but that the union employees want them in a contract.
