New Techniques Effect Savings in TV Materials

NEW YORK (AP) The nation's television set manufacturers may be able to continue civilian production by using new techniques effecting drastic savings of critical materials, including copper and cobalt.

Max Balcom, chairman of the tube division of the Radio-Television Manufacturers Association and board chairman of Sylvania Electric Products Corp., says that a change in the method of focusing the picture on the viewing screen has greatly improved prospects for a continued supply of sets.

Present sets have picture tubes using "electro-magnetic focusing." This requires either a magnet containing cobalt or a copper coil. Both metals are vital for defense weapons.

New tubes now ready for production, using so-called "electrostatic focusing," do not require these metals.

The Sylvania Company and Radio Corporation of America already are geared to produce the new tubes, while another firm, the National Union Radio Corporation, says it is ready to start deliveries.

Tests of the new tubes show them to be of equal in quality to the old ones, the manufacturers say.
