Those of us who went through the University of Wisconsin school of journalism with him back before World War II recall him as a mystic genius with a strange sense of humor and an inner conscience that made it difficult really to know him.

When he was found dead in his New York apartment at the peak of his fame, his old pals at school were shocked but somehow not too surprised, for Heggen always lived in a mental world of his own.

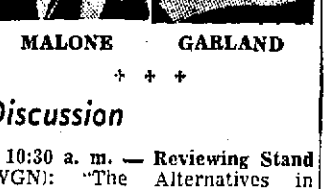
