## Movie Lore Preserved in College Display

ITHACA, N. Y.—(UPI)—The history of American motion pictures from 1910 to the present is depicted in a growing collection of "stills" assembled by the Cornell university theater.  
 The library contains about 6,000 pictures, about half of which came to the university recently in a collection made by the late Frank H. Chase, Syracuse drama critic. It contains virtually every prominent star who has taken part in American films.  
 Prof. Walter H. Stainton, executive director of the university theater, began the collection casually in 1936 by saving the stills which accompanied the films contracted for by the theater. The addition of the Chase collection fills in the period beginning in 1910.

**THE THEATER:** An exhibition tracing the history of the theater from ancient ritual to Broadway is now on view in the lobby of the Wisconsin Union theater.

The exhibition, prepared by the editors of Life magazine, contains many photos from its files on the American stage in the past 10 years.  
 The 25 panels are divided into four sections: "The Beginning of Theater," "Tragic Theaters," "The Perennial Life of Comedy," and "Theater in the Modern World."  
 The first section touches upon the ritualistic aspects of present-day Indian dances, relating them to the Greek festivals of Dionysus. The second deals with Greek and Shakespearean tragedy, and the section on comedy shows the development of both popular farce and high comedy. The final section begins with Ibsen and Chekhov and includes pictures from many current productions.  
 The text for exhibition was written by Francis Ferguson, author of the critical study, "The Idea of a Theater," published last year by the Princeton University Press.  
 The IBM collection of Mexican paintings, watercolors, and graphics, now on view in the main and theater galleries of the Union, will close Sunday.
