Protested Painting of Scalping Rehung

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23. (AP) The painting of an Indian scalping a white man has been returned to its old place on the wall of the House interior affairs committee room.
Former Rep. Peterson (D-Fla.) had it taken down last year after Charley Grounds, a Seminole Indian attorney from Oklahoma, protested it was in bad taste and offended every Indian who entered the room.
Rep. Murdock (D-Ariz.), the new committee chairman, had it put back. It was one of a set painted by Maj. Gen. S. Richardson nearly a century ago. Murdock told a reporter, and he thought they should all be hung together.

HOME TO L. Y. Reservist's Son Regains Appetite

FORT WAYNE, Ind., Feb. 23. (AP) Policeman James Ostermeyer Sr. is back from the Navy to stay so his 4-year-old son, Jimm., will feel more like eating again.
Jimm., who once won a battle with infantile paralysis, lost so much weight after his father was called up as a naval reservist, that the Navy agreed to send Ostermeyer home for a visit. When he arrived home Tuesday, he brought Jimm., the best possible news—he's not going away again.



Solon Seeking Ban of Red Lobbyists

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23. (AP) Rep. Mills (D-Ark.) wants to prevent Communists and their sympathizers from taking up the time of Congressional committees.
He told a reporter he plans legislation which would bar any person from registering as a lobbyist who has been cited for contempt of Congress or who is a member of any group officially branded as subversive. Only registered lobbyists may represent organizations before committees.

Gasoline Consumption 34 Gal. per Capita

SACRAMENTO, Feb. 23. (AP) Motor-minded Californians—all 10,500,000 of them—used an estimated 34 gallons of motor vehicle fuel a piece in 1950.
The State Board of Equalization today announced 3,600,000,000 gallons of gasoline, butane, propane, and non-Air Force aviation fuel, was distributed in 1950. It represented about an 8 per cent increase over 1949.

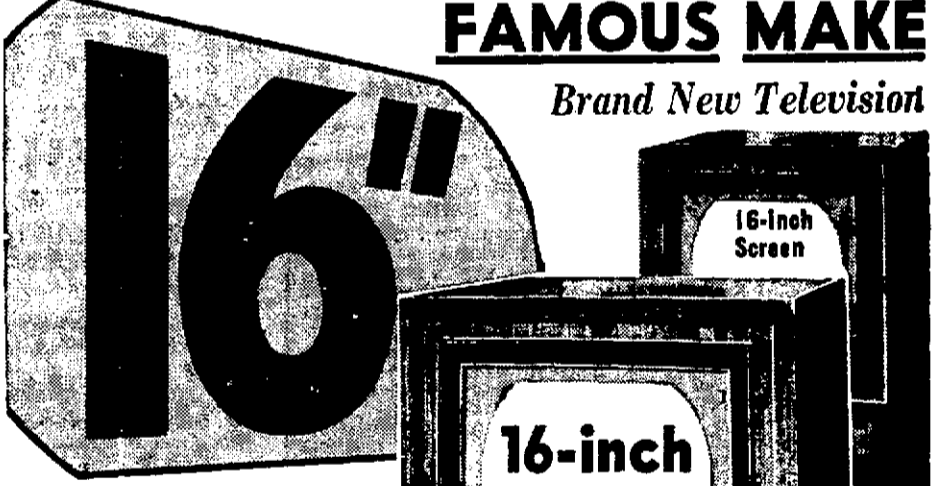
