

## Advice on Your HEALTH

Some diseases are serious in themselves; others are dreaded because of what they may lead to. Among the latter is a disorder known as polyposis of the colon, in which there is an overgrowth of the tissues of the large bowel. Unless this disease is recognized early and adequately treated, it almost always develops into malignant or cancerous growths.

Though the condition is apparently inherited, it does not appear to begin until adolescence. Symptoms seldom appear in those under 20 and may not develop before 40.

The overgrowth is not confined to one spot, but is scattered throughout the large bowel. Its possibility must always be suspected when there are such symptoms as frequent bowel movements containing pus and blood, and when there is a marked loss of weight and strength. During the annual health audit which every person should have, a search may well be made for the presence of polyps in the bowel.

### May Be Detected

If the condition is present, it may be detected by examining the bowel through an instrument known as the sigmoidoscope, which consists of a tube and a light. If the polyp is seen in this way, X-ray examination is carried out which will show how widespread the condition may be.

Since this condition is a severe one and dangerous if neglected, it requires active treatment. The treatment which seems to find most favor is burning off of the polyps in the rectum by the process known as fulguration. Then the entire colon is removed by operation. If the operation is carried out promptly, the person's prospects of remaining permanently well are greatly increased.

Of course, there are many causes for frequent bowel movements with mucus and blood other than multiple polyposis. The same symptoms may occur in ulcerative colitis. Fortunately, this disorder is not a too frequent one, and with prompt diagnosis and treatment its dangerous effects may be warded off.

### What Kind of Mate for Son?

Parents Rate Qualifications

Q. What do parents want their sons to look for in a mate?

A. To find out, Professor Roy E. Barber queried 84 fathers and 86 mothers, asking each group of parents nine questions. Their replies make interesting reading.

Asked whether they would allow their son to marry a person of lower economic rank than their own, 78% of the mothers wanted their sons to wed a girl with the same education and intelligence; 21% of the fathers and 16% of the mothers said they would actually want their offspring to marry a girl with less intelligence or education; and 15% of the fathers and only five per cent of the mothers expressed a preference for a girl with more intelligence and/or education than their sons.

Fifty-six per cent of the fathers and fifty-five per cent of the mothers declared they had no objection to their son marrying a girl who wasn't good looking.

In sharp contrast, however, 91% of the mothers expressed a decided unwillingness for their offspring to wed a girl with an unattractive disposition and personality.

These parents were even more emphatic when it came to the question of marrying a girl with lower moral standards than their sons, 86% of both fathers and mothers declaring they would refuse their consent to such a marriage.

Only 35% of the fathers and 38% of the mothers would be willing for their son to marry a girl from a family inferior to their own.

Eighty per cent of the fathers and eighty-one per cent of the mothers replied they would oppose their son marrying a girl of different religious faith.

When it came to health there was virtual unanimity among fathers and mothers. All of the former and 95% of the latter said they wouldn't want their child to marry a girl whose health was bad when they first became acquainted. However, 22% of the fathers and

27% of the mothers said they wouldn't object if the girl's health became bad after an intimate friendship had been formed.

A Sixty-six per cent of the fathers and fifty-five per cent of the mothers would be willing for their son to marry a girl less intelligent and/or education. But 84% of the fathers and 78% of the mothers wanted their sons to wed a girl with the same education and intelligence; 21% of the fathers and 16% of the mothers said they would actually want their offspring to marry a girl with less intelligence or education; and 15% of the fathers and only five per cent of the mothers expressed a preference for a girl with more intelligence and/or education than their sons.

These men and women knew the heat of battle but they knew too, the glory of standing fast, keeping the faith and maintaining the dignity of the human spirit. Could we want more for our children?
